Regarding I. N. Day, Oregon Voter says that he is a man of tremendous industry and energy, powerful will and big calibre, eminently fitted by character, intellectual attainments and personality for a seat in the United States Senate rather than the Oregon State Senate.

Arthur B. Carlson is a young business man of Portland who should go to the legislature. He is a printer, is interested in education and measures for the general welfare of the state. We advise voters to select, so far as possible, experienced business men as the safest legislators, especially in these days of reconstruction.

The editor has made a careful study of the measures to be voted on and feels clear and safe in recommending that all be voted "Yes" except the one relating to a successor to the governor in case of vacancy. The present proposal making the president of the senate, or the speaker of the house, automatically succeed the governor, in case of vacancy, is unsound and uncalled for, if not vicious. Vote it down. Oregon should provide for a lieutenant-governor.

"I will handle your business in a business-like way," says Walter D. Whitcomb, republican candidate for the legislature. Mr. Whitcomb is a certified public accountant of wide experience. His reputation is above question. His character is also good, and his business connections too great to make it possible for him to compromise on any legislation for the public good. He is a careful, clean, experienced business man and should be nominated. Don't miss his name.

As in the past, the Outlook is firm in its conviction that no republican voter can honor himself, or herself, more at the coming primary than to cast a good clean, fearless vote for Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois for presidential nominee. It is useless to fill up space with further eulogies or reasons for nominating Lowden. In brief, he is the best or the several good men who are possibilities. Don't be influenced by the popularity of any candidate. Above all we would suggest this is no time to put either a radical or untried man in the president's chair. The eleventh hour appeal to vote for a certain candidate just to defeat Johnson is not well founded. A vote for Lowden will help just as much to defeat the no-league champion.

Ryneron Typifies Union Sense of Order.

There are two kinds of thinkers among labor men in America. Both are honest. One despairs of parliamentary methods and sneers at the ballot. He talks of direct action, one big union and the dictatorship of the proletariat. The other pins his faith to the democratic idea. He is as dissatisfied as the other, but he believes he can gain his ends legally. Such a man should have the good will of those of us who do not belong to labor unions. And such a man is C. M. Ryneron, editor of the "Labor Press" and a candidate for state senator. That Mr. Ryneron seeks a seat in the legislature is in itself proof that he believes in parliamentary methods as against violence. Predatory interests do not like Ryneron, but honest business men have no need to fear him. He has had training, yet he is in the ranks of the workers. He is level-headed, alert and square.

THOMAS A. SWEENEY IS AN ARDENT AMERICAN

Thomas A. Sweeney, republican candidate for congress, is an ardent American of the Roosevelt type and an account of his advocacy and support of the lamented Roosevelt in 1912 has been classified by some sources as a radical. This charge is directed at him mainly by big business, those who were and are 100 per cent profiteers and by the political bosses in this third district.

The public school system of this nation, he says, is the one institution upon which all other national institutions are based and it must be supported and preserved so that Americanism shall not be endangered. Mr. Sweeney has received the endorsement of labor, of Troop A, which saw service on the border; of the Private Soldiers and Sailors Legion; of the Association of Fathers of Soldiers and Sailors of U. S. A. (Daddies club) and of the National American War Mothers, as well as other organizations.

He is a firm believer in the square deal policy of Roosevelt and that is what he will give this district when he goes to congress.

NOTICE OF ELECTION TO CHANGE BOUNDARIES

Notice is hereby given that petitions have been presented to the Common Council of the Town of Gresham, Multnomah County, Oregon, requesting the boundaries of the said Town of Gresham be changed so as to include new and additional territory within such boundaries as follows, to-wit:

The West half (1/2) of the Northeast quarter (1/4) of the Northeast quarter (1/4) of section fifteen (15), Township One (1) South, Range Three (3) East of the Willamette Meridian, and except the following bounded and described tract of land containing one acre beginning at the Southeast corner of above described land, running thence North along the East line thereof sixteen (16) rods; thence West ten (10) rods; thence south sixteen (16) rods; thence east ten (10) rods to the place of beginning, also.

Beginning at a point in the center of the Section Line Road and the West boundary of the Town of Gresham; thence North to the center line of the John P. Powell D. L. C., thence West tracing the said center line of the John P. Powell D. L. C. to the West line of Minnie S. Clanaahs seven and one-half-acre tract of land; thence South crossing the Section Line Road to the South line of C. R. Miller's twenty acre tract of land; thence East to the West boundary line of the Town of Gresham; thence North to the place of beginning, containing twenty-four acres more or less.

And as said petitions were signed by the owners of said described land and more than one-fifth of the legal voters of the Town of Gresham as shown by the vote cast at the last Municipal election held therein, the said Council of the Town of Gresham has ordered that an election be held at which the proposition proposed by said petition shall be submitted to the legal voters of the Town of Gresham and of Territory to be annexed.

That said election be called to be held in the Town of Gresham on the 21st day of May, 1920. That at the said election the legal voters of the Town of Gresham and of the territory to be annexed be requested to attend and vote on said proposition of increasing and changing the boundary limits of the Town of Gresham so as to include the new and additional territory as hereinbefore specifically set out and said voters are requested to express themselves on said proposition by placing on their ballot at said special election the words "for annexation" or "against annexation" or other equivalent words expressing their preference; that the polling places fixed for the holding of such election will be at the regular polling places for the State Primary election in precincts 308, 309, and 309 1/2 and that the polls will be from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. on May 21, 1920 for the holding of said election.

"The combined saving of time and fuel effected in this way is a substantial item. It is a practical contribution to the greater economy of commercial car transportation."

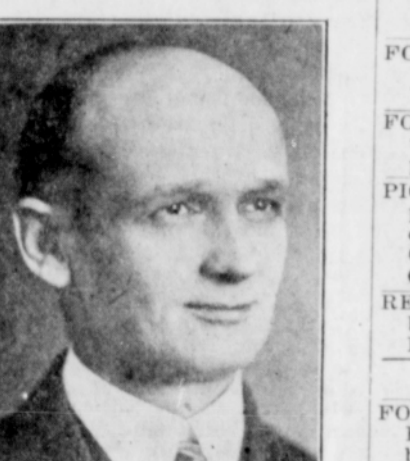
