IMPRESSIONS.

The campaign just closed has been an interesting one for several reasons. It has called for more publicity than usual, especially appeals through the newspapers. Hence the public has had an opportunity to know and consider the qualifications of the candidates more thoroughly than is ordinarily the case.

What is the object of all of this ticket making? What are the influences urging the newspapers to publish their (supposed) list of candidates and differing so widely? Personally we think the practice is rather misleading if not vicious.

We deprecate the practice of ticket making. It confuses the voter. Societies of similar names put out printed endorsements of differing sets of candidates. The question is often asked, Who's ticket are you going to vote? It tends to destroy the voter's individuality and exercise of his own judgment.

This is the first state election in which the ex-service men have run for elective offices. The appeal to voters based on service in the war has been prominent in the slogans. This we think is a great mistake and doubt if it is the argument that will have the desired weight with the voter.

An election should be educational. A candidate must expect to have his reputation and record shown up. The voters want to know him. Political intrigue and trickery should be relegated to the past. Let the people read and think and choose their representatives.

Presumably after today a lot of candidates will be able to see themselves as others see them.

Whoever is nominated in the Oregon primaries for president, it will only be the last wag of the tail of the republican elephant.
