Louis Grantaire inherited a timber kingdom from his father and set out to view his holdings through the eyes of a lumber-jack.

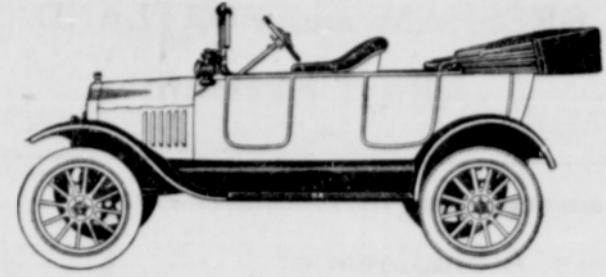
