WHY NOT VOTE, YES?

Elsewhere our readers will find a communication signed by D. W. McKay of Fairview, addressed to school voters of Fairview district, setting forth several reasons why the district should not vote to come into the union high school district.

It is hoped all these districts will vote to join the present union high district and thus plan for a larger and better future, educationally for the youth of a larger area by building up an agricultural high school second to none in the state.

The union high school is no longer an experiment. It is well started, is in good condition financially, has grown during the past five years beyond all expectations, is literally bursting its bounds, which is a hopeful sign, has a most excellent reputation and is big with prospect of successful growth and enlargement.

As to being tied up for all time to come, that doesn't look reasonable. Changes can certainly be brought about in the future when need arises.

As to the prospects of large growth over on the Columbia river we are glad to believe this will be brought about. But how soon will it be sufficient to warrant forming a high school district there? May be five years; maybe ten years. Would it be delayed by using the nearest and best high school facilities available in the meantime? Would it not be furthered?

This is the day of enlargement and co-operation. Many small communities unite to acquire advantages not possible to any one. In union is strength. It is wise to plan for the future. No district is asked to join the union district in order to assume a burden but in order to safely and surely enlarge their own opportunity and make possible a larger opportunity for all others.

Our readers are invited to take a broader view of their own relation to the educational problems of a locality. As new families shall wish to settle at Fairview will they not naturally ask, "What are your school facilities? Have you a high school?" Will the answer be "No; none nearer than Portland, and they are all overcrowded." If the answer could be, "Yes; we belong to a large union high district with 15 or 20 or more highly trained educators, with a fully equipped school, with fine inspirational advantages — within easy reach" — would it not go a long way to encourage new comers and raise the educational tone of the locality?

Sympathy with Armenia and willingness to give freely to mitigate Armenian suffering are one thing. To send thousands of American young men there to do garrison and police duty for many years to come, at the expense of billions to the Treasury, as proposed by the President, that is quite another thing.

WAR DEPARTMENT ASKS SERVICE MEN TO ANSWER

The following questionnaire has been sent out by the service and information branch of the office of the Secretary of War, with the request that all ex-service men answer the questions and send it to Capt. H. C. Billings, in charge of the Western District, War Department:

The service and information branch, office of the assistant to the Secretary of War, has undertaken to find out if it can be of assistance to any soldier, sailor or marine who served in the World War. This is not a new service by any means, but just another way of getting in close touch with those who might be having trouble in the adjustment of their accounts with the government.

We will be more than pleased to have you take up any of the following matters with us and will endeavor to secure prompt action on every case presented. Address Capt. H. C. Billings, in charge Western District, War Department, 809 Flood Building, San Francisco, Cal.

(Note—Give full information on each case separately, showing when and where you entered the service, your rank, company, organization, serial number, where stationed, when and where discharged, present address, and any other information pertinent to the case.)

1 Have you received a proper discharge?

2 Have you received your bonus of \$60.00?

3 Have you received your full travel pay of five cents per mile?

4 Have you received your lost baggage?

5 Have you received the liberty bonds that you subscribed for while in service?

6 Were the allotments deducted from your pay paid to the proper persons and in the proper amounts?

7 Do you wish any information regarding the conversion of your insurance?

8 If your insurance has lapsed, do you wish to have it reinstated?

9 Were you disabled in the service?

10 If so, are you drawing compensation for disability?

11 Are you in need of any medical care or treatment?

12 If disabled, do you wish to take vocational education?

13 Are you out of employment?

14 Have you received a Victory button issued by the government?

15 If not, do you wish one?

16 Do you know of any tubercular soldiers?

17 If so, please give his name and address.

18 Do you know of any insane soldier or sailor?

19 If so, please give his name and address.

These questions can be answered on another sheet of paper. Be sure to give your name and address, and your army rank, company organization and serial number in sending these questionnaires in.

OREGON STATE CHAMBER COMMENCE TO EXPEND

With practically every community in Oregon organized the intensive canvass throughout the state in the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce expansion movement will begin June 14th. The canvass will continue until August 1st.

The educational work in connection with the expansion movement, which began several weeks ago, will continue during June and July.

Twelve men, composing six teams of two men each, will direct the intensive organization work simultaneously in six different sections of the state. They will be assisted by 80 community executive committees appointed during the state-wide survey conducted preliminary to the intensive organization work.

Leading men in every section of Oregon are affiliated with the State Chamber in the capacity of committee chairman and members in the movement to raise a budget of \$450,000 (\$150,000 a year) covering a 3-year period with which to carry on the development work of the State Chamber. More than 200 endorsements have been received from these men approving the expansion movement and citing the need for such an agency as the State Chamber to take the initiative in development problems affecting the entire state.

Of the total sum to be raised, \$180,000 (\$60,000 a year) covering a 3-year period will be raised in Portland the week of June 6th. The Portland canvass will be made June 9th, 10th and 11th. The remainder of the budget totaling \$270,000 (\$90,000 a year) covering a 3-year period will be raised in the 36 counties outside of Portland.
