At the N. C. Hall sale of registered Shorthorns held at Ridgfield, Washington on June 2 the sales were very good. Fourteen cows brought \$4550 an average of \$323.93 each. Eight bulls were sold for \$1825 or an average price of \$228. The young stock brought high prices also. One heifer calf sold for \$190 and the cheapest bull calf \$125 while one sold for \$525.

One cow brought \$625 while the lowest one sold for \$200. The entire head averaged \$285 each.
