FAIR BOARD FACES COMPLEX SITUATION

At the fair board meeting held Monday afternoon the question of the right of the town council to use the fairgrounds as an auto parking grounds was discussed. The members of the council believe that there is reserved in the deed the right of the town of Gresham to use the fair grounds at any time they choose, excepting the 20 days which the fair association may choose at any time between August 15 and November 1.

The fair board members are of the opinion that they have met all of the conditions required in the original franchise and deed and that they have the right to prohibit the town of Gresham from using the grounds for a parking ground. Records are being gone into and an interesting situation is opened. Unless a compromise is made or the fair association produces some different records to cancel those of the town, the matter will have to be further thrashed out.

At the meeting the fair board were much opposed to the use of the grounds as a camping ground on account of the damage which would result to the buildings. The council however has planned to protect the buildings.

The matter will probably be discussed at the town council meeting which will be held Wednesday evening, June 9.

C. D. Minton, manager, reported that the entire machinery hall has been sold to automobile accessory men. A tent will be rented to house the machinery.

The board also voted to cancel the shares in the fair association which had been returned by Commissioners Holman, Hoyt and Muck.

Mrs. Roy Kern reported on the progress in the flower beds which this year will be planted by amateurs instead of professional florists as has been the custom in former years. Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 have been offered and \$5 for each additional bed. A number have applied and have been assigned flower beds already.

SCHOOL ELECTION CALLED FOR JUNE 12

Notices have been posted in Cedar, Lusted, Fairview, Rockwood and Victory districts as well as Union High school District No. 2 calling an election to vote on the petitions of the districts named who are petitioning to join the Union high school district. The election will be held Saturday, June 12.

The voting in the union district will be at the Bank of Gresham from 9 a. m. until 3 p. m.

In the other districts each board will set the voting hours for their district.

The Clackamas county school district boundary board has set June 19 as the date for voting upon the question in Union No. 26 and in Cottrell district.

Several questions have arisen over the qualifications for voters. Section 233 Oregon school laws for 1919 under Qualifications of Voters reads as follows:

Any citizen of this state, male or female, who is 21 years of age and has resided in the district 30 days immediately preceding the election and has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax, shall be entitled to vote at any school meeting or election in said district, provided, that any person shall be deemed to have complied with the property qualifications imposed by this section who presents to the directors or judges of election satisfactory evidence that he or she has stock, shares, or ownership in any corporation, firm or copartnership which has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, provided further that in districts of the third class, any head of a family who is otherwise a qualified elector, and having children of school age, may vote at such election without property qualifications.
