existence of God, the immortality of the soul, the accountability of man to God for his actions. None have chosen these three that every Catholic in the country believes, that every Jew in the country believes, and that every Christian in the world believes. And I say to you this morning that the state has a right to teach in her great school system, these great principles that are essential to her perpetuity, not because they pertain to the future welfare of man but because they pertain to the present and future welfare of the state itself.

I have some more things to say but my time is past and I will sum up. First, the public school is our assimilative and digestive organ where we are to make of the foreign children and children of foreign parentage and also of our own children, real American citizens worth while. That is the institution and the state has control over that institution, also the state has a right to do what is necessary for its own perpetuity and development and for the benefit of the people is an absolute necessity to the perpetuity and advancement of our government, and religion is the foundation upon which morality is built. Therefore, the state has a right to teach in her great school system, these great principles—a belief in the existence of God, the immortality of the soul, and an accountability of man to God for his actions.
