STATE CHAMBER SEEKS TO DOUBLE POPULATION ON FARMS IN 3 YEARS

Oregon has water resources to irrigate 4,000,000 acres of land now unproductive, and which would support in comfort, 200,000 new population, or about 40,000 new families.

If in its three year's campaign to put families on Oregon's vacant land, the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce can bring 1,000 families to utilize this land and water, it will mean in expenditures alone for such commodities as clothing, food, furniture, etc., of \$1,000,000, calculating the expenditures for an entire family at only \$1000 per year, to say nothing of the wealth produced by these new settlers.

Land settlement is one of the chief aims of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce extension program in its movement to aid in the development of the State.

Notice to Property Owners.

By order of the council of the Town of Gresham attention is directed to the following from Ordinance No. 85 of the Town of Gresham:

"It is hereby made the duty of the owner, agent or occupant of land bordering on a street which has been improved by the construction of sidewalks thereon, to cut and remove from the street all grass, weeds and brush between the sidewalk covering and the curb and property lines at least twice each year; once between the first and fifteenth days of the month of June, and once between the fifteenth and thirtieth days of the month of September."

"Conviction for a violation of this Ordinance carries a fine of not less than five or more than twenty dollars."

Also—

"That it shall be unlawful for any owner, agent or tenant of any land within the corporate limits of the Town of Gresham to maintain or allow to be maintained any outside toilet unless properly connected with a septic tank or closed cess pool. One exception is made to the above order in that any toilet located at a distance of two (200) hundred yards or more from any other dwelling, and with the consent of the Health and Police committee, may be allowed to remain."

"Conviction for violation of this Ordinance carries a penalty of not less than five or more than twenty-five dollars."
