Democracy vs. Autocracy.

Hon. Charles E. Hughes of New York delivered an address at the celebration of the 100th year of the Harvard Law School. He took for his subject "Legal Education and Democratic Progress."

"We went to war for liberty and democracy with the result that we fed the autocratic appetite, and we have seen the war powers, which are essential to the preservation of the nation in time of war, exercised broadly after the military exigency had passed and in conditions for which they were never intended, and we may well wonder whether constitutional government as heretofore maintained in this republic could survive another great war even victoriously waged."

"Apart from these considerations we cannot afford to ignore the indications that the essentials of liberty are being disregarded. Very recently information has been laid by responsible citizens at the bar of public opinion of violation of personal rights which savor of the worst practices of tyranny. And in conduct of trials before the courts we find a growing tendency on the part of prosecutors to report to grossly unfair practices."

This is a strong statement and one worth pondering over by every American citizen with the best interest of his country at heart for Mr. Hughes speaks the truth.

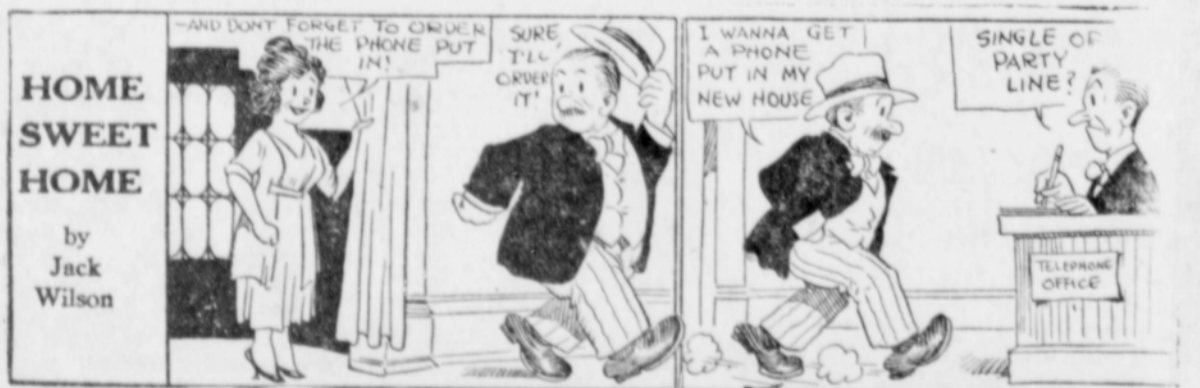
