

OVERLAND CAR MAKES RECORD ON GALLON GAS

A four-cylinder Overland stock touring car, driven by C. H. Amon has shattered all world records for gasoline economy in automobile operation, when it traveled 106.4 miles on one gallon of gasoline on the California state highway in San Joaquin valley, June 28.

The car traveled for seven hours and twenty-one minutes without a stop and at an average speed of fifteen miles an hour. It had been determined by several trial runs that it was at that speed that the car produced its maximum economy.

The Fresno-Bakersfield highway where the trial was made is practically as level as a billiard table and there is no opportunity for long coasting. In fact, Bakersfield is about 100 feet higher than the starting point.

The test was honestly made and a small army of motor trade authorities and newspaper representatives accompanied the car and at the conclusion signed affidavits as to the authority of the performance of the Overland world's record smasher.

A car of the same kind is making a transcontinental trip and the following telegram received by H. H. Eling, manager of the Willys Overland Pacific Company, reports progress: "Transcontinental car left Joliet, Illinois, 8 p. m. Tuesday, (July 20) 964 miles in 44 hours, averaging 22 1/2 miles per gallon; roads rough; 12 drivers so far."

Overland enthusiasts are watching this car's record with great interest.
