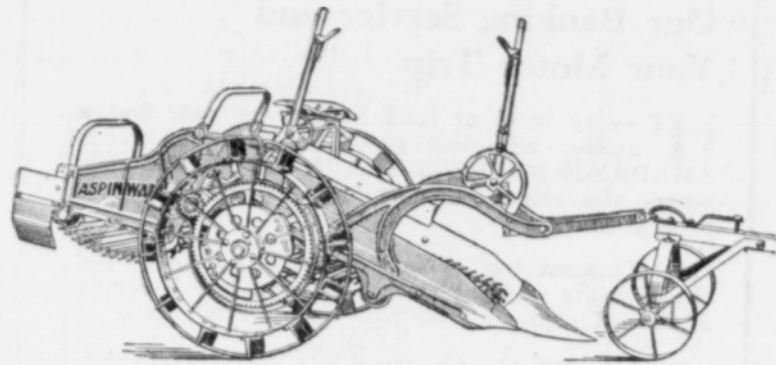

### WANTED, A NAME

July 26, 1920.—The naming of the locality in Clackamas county about four miles south of Gresham, may be delayed a few weeks yet. The reason is that Walter Ramser, who started the name contest is in the hospital where he has been for two weeks, slowly recovering from a severe electric shock. On the second Monday of July, about ten o'clock in the morning, the high power wires of the Cazadero line got out of commission near Wilson corners, and started a terrific cannonade, but very beautiful illumination. Immediately the N. 5 line of the Damascus telephone was burned out, and Ramser's phone shot two-foot flames into the room. In order to save the house from being consumed by fire, Walter Ramser pulled down one of the telephone wires, consisting of rusty hay wire, with a wooden-handled clawhammer. Now he is at the St. Vincent hospital at Portland. The toes of the left foot are soon healed; the small toe of the right foot may be saved from amputation, and the other toes are doing well. Three fingers and one thumb were absolutely senseless for about a week, but are getting along slowly. He will be in the hospital at least a week yet, and wishes his friends to know that he is getting along as well as can be expected under the circumstances, that the pains have been rapidly decreasing since Saturday, and that he can look for a complete recovery by the first of September, and probably sooner.
