THE BANKING HABIT.

Government reports show that there are 190 deposit accounts to every 1000 of population taking the United States as a whole.

Wyoming stands first with 394 depositors per 1000 of population. Montana was next with 349 per 1000 of population. The twelve states whose national banks reported the next largest number of deposit accounts in proportion to population were in the order named: Idaho, 293; Pennsylvania, 289; Colorado, 280; Oregon, 275; Minnesota, 271; Iowa, 262; Virginia, 259; Vermont, 255; California, 248; South Dakota, 244; Maine, 239; Texas, 236; per 1000 of population.

Six per cent of the world's population.

Fifty-two per cent of the world's coal.

Previous to 1914, we owed England so much money that the annual interest was three hundred million dollars. Now England is paying us one hundred fifty million dollars a year interest. Before the war, we owed about four billion dollars abroad. Today the net indebtedness of Europe to America is ten billion dollars. America is now the richest nation and the financial center of the world.

Before the war, England was the greatest ship-owning nation. After 1920, America will have twice as many ships as England.

Postal Examination to Be Held.

The United States Civil Service commission has announced an examination for the county of Multnomah to be held at Portland on September 11, 1920, to fill the position of rural carrier at Corbett and Hillsdale, and vacancies that occur on rural routes from other postoffices in this county.

The salary is \$1800 per year for the standard 24-mile route with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each additional mile above the 24-mile standard.

Philippine Scare-crow Attracts Marine.

Because his soul had become attuned to the jazz music of bamboo rice whistles, Sergeant John H. McClasky re-enlisted in the marine corps at San Francisco for Philippine service.

The Negritos of the Philippines cut bamboo whistles which they fasten to fences around their rice fields, according to McClasky. When the wind blows they produce a weird screeching sound which keeps away birds that are destructive to the crops.

Sergeant McClasky has just finished a term with the marines in the Orient, and will return there on the next transport leaving here for Manila.

ANOTHER RAID BRINGS QUANTITY OF MOONSHINE

A raid made by five deputy sheriffs last Tuesday evening at the 12-mile house resulted in the discovery of four 52-gallon barrels of fermented cherry juice in a cellar under the barn on the Cross Roads farm at the 12-mile corner according to Deputy M. M. Squires who participated.

The moonshine was cleverly concealed in a cellar and there was nothing to indicate that there was a cellar under the barn. One corner of the barn was partitioned off to form a bedroom and adjoining this was a small harness room which was not in use apparently. Some old harness and straw covered the floor. The floor, however, lifted up disclosing a flight of stairs leading into the cellar where standing in a row were the four barrels of fermented cherry juice.
