**Boys' and Girls' Industrial Club Work Profitable.**

Mrs. E. D. Palmer, chairman of the committee on Industrial club work for boys and girls of the Portland public schools, will have in charge at the Gresham fair ten booths for the exhibition of the work of the industrial clubs of ten of the Portland schools. The fair will be held in October from the 4th to the 9th, inclusive. All schools intending to exhibit their work should make their entries soon, so that the work of classification for booth arrangements may be facilitated.
