Miss Ruth Iekler and Miss Charlotte Milsted are spending a week in Portland visiting friends.

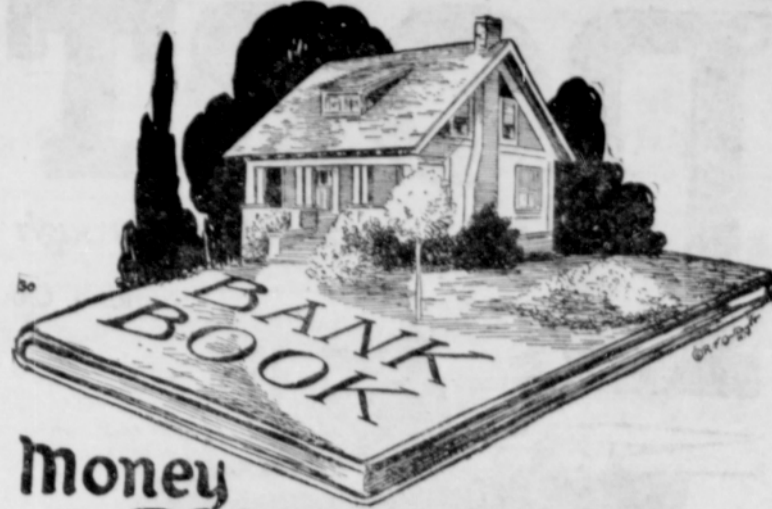

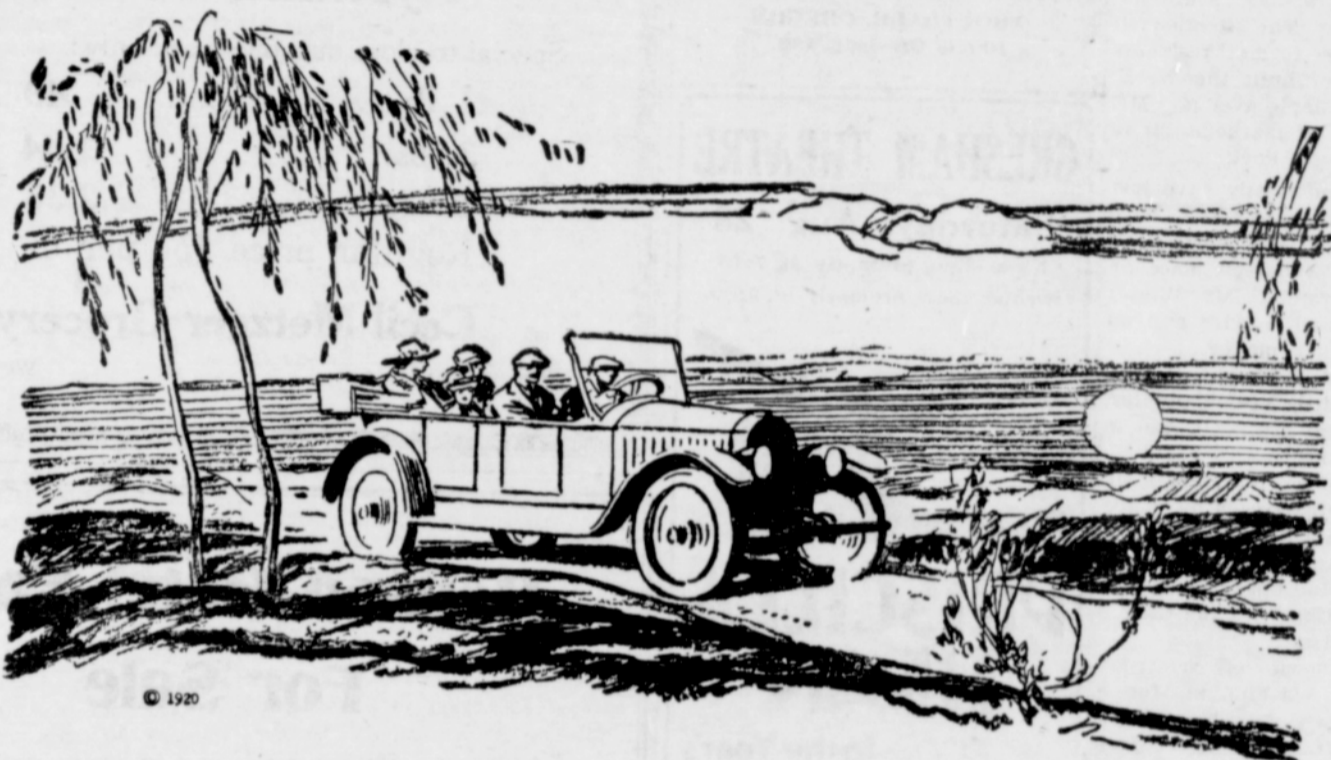
