WHERE DOES ALDERSON STAND?

The recollection of Senate Bill No. 45 is still fresh in the minds of the voters of this locality. The spirit and purpose of that bill was unification of country school districts, providing for one board to administer all the country districts and giving the county school superintendent almost unlimited power in supervising such administration. County Superintendent Alderson was the father of said bill and worked for its enactment. As a compromise the legislature made it effective only when voted favorably by the people within a certain territory. The matter all but came to a vote in Multnomah county. There was much opposition to it and through some technical loop hole it did not come to a vote.

A new provision relative to high schools was enacted at the 1919 session of the legislature encouraging the formation of small high schools throughout the state and providing that the high school may receive from the county high school tuition fund an amount equal to the cost of educating the first ten pupils in such high school.

The law reads as follows: "Before making an apportionment of the county high school tuition fund the county school superintendent shall apportion to each high school in his county a sum that will equal the total cost of educating the first ten pupils in each of such high schools; provided that in determining the rate of tuition to be paid to a high school for a pupil attending from outside the high school district, the amount so apportioned for the first ten pupils shall be deducted from the total amount expended by the high school district for maintaining high school during such school year."

Superintendent Churchill, recently in Gresham, is quoted as saying that this is one of the most vicious laws ever put on our statute books relating to schools. He predicted this law would be soon repealed. Superintendent Alderson, it is said, was present at the time Superintendent Churchill made this remark. The state superintendent is also reported to have said that in five or ten years there would be not more but fewer and better high schools in the state than at present.

We would like to know County Superintendent Alderson's attitude with

reference to consolidation of public schools. It might be inferred that at one time he was in favor of consolidation of grade schools but that at present he does not favor the building up of central high schools. In this respect, at least, he does not seem to be in accord with State Superintendent Churchill or with the apparent trend of educational methods at the present day.

POWELL VALLEY GIRLS LEAVE FOR SPOKANE

The Oregon State canning team left Monday evening for Spokane where they will demonstrate one day this week in competition with other state teams for northwest championship honors.

The girls have been doing good work the past two weeks under the direction of Miss Helen Cowgill the state leader. The girls have given five public demonstrations during the summer. One was at Sylvan school, west of Portland, one at O. A. C. in June, one at the L. L. Kidder Hardware store in Gresham, one at Cascade Locks, and one at the Powell Valley schoolhouse where they demonstrated for the Orient canning team and a number of other visitors.

In totaling their season's work last Saturday they found they had canned about 550 quarts of fruit and vegetables this summer.

Saturday the girls had their last practice work at which time they put on the best work of the season. They finished the demonstration in 16 minutes.

After the demonstration Saturday the girls, assisted by their mothers, served lunch in the basement of the school to the leaders, Miss Cowgill, the state leader, and Miss Calkins, county leader, and Mrs. Alta Gentry, local leader, who trained the girls last year. Mr. McConnell from Portland was also present. Mrs. Frank Gustafson and Mrs. Carl Nelson were present.

Miss Cowgill, who accompanies the girls on their trip to Spokane, has promised to wire the date of the demonstration and the result as soon as it is decided and club workers and friends of the girls will anxiously wait for word from them.

REPUBLICANS PROMISE A REAL 'DIRT FARMER'

The statement by Governor Cox that if elected president, he would appoint a real "dirt farmer" Secretary of Agriculture, proved high explosive campaign ammunition for Albert Lindley, Stockton farmer and a western republican leader. While at first amused at Governor Cox's criticism of the Wilson administration in naming two theorists to be the agricultural head, Lindley rushed to the defense of former Secretary James Wilson of Iowa, the real builder of the department of Agriculture, in the following statement to his farmer and rancher friends throughout the west:

"Candidate Cox seems to forget that the republicans placed a real 'dirt farmer' at the head of the Department of Agriculture and that he remained there for 16 years until he made it the greatest department of its kind in the world. This was James Wilson of Iowa, a real farmer from a real farm. He ran it for the farmers and at the same time he made it serve all of the nation.

When the democrats took hold of things in Washington they made a university president Secretary of Agriculture and they followed him with a publisher to complete the work of driving all remaining practical ideas out of the department that Jim Wilson labored 16 years to install. Candidate Cox need have no concern about the next Secretary of Agriculture being a real 'dirt farmer'. The republican party will make certain of that."
