### TROUTDALE INTERESTED IN CONSOLIDATION

Troutdale, Oregon, Sept. 6, 1920.—Editor Outlook:—A special meeting was called for District No. 20, Troutdale, to vote on paying transportation of high school pupils to Portland for the coming term. More voters attended than have been at any school meeting here for years. Many who could not vote came out of interest in pending school matters.

After much discussion over provisions of transportation measure, it was lost by a vote of 21 to seven. Most of those who opposed it did so, not with the intention of blocking education, but out of objection to a makeshift which, once adopted, would become sufficient and nothing more would ever be done.

Cost of tuition and transportation would amount to \$150 per pupil, not excessive for benefits derived, because the Portland schools offer pupils such wide scope in educational opportunity, but we cannot always depend on Portland for help.

Too much time is consumed in travel to and from school, due to distance and car service, the pupils are very much inconvenienced. They cannot participate in school activities, such as athletics, glee clubs, etc., which round out the lives of the boys and girls. The school life is too far separated from the home life.

Though the meeting was not called for consolidation purposes, everyone voiced the opinion that such was the real issue. A straw vote, taken to learn the sentiment of the people, showed all in favor of uniting with Fairview and Rockwood.

Taxation and bonding were favorably discussed, showing there is only lack of a leader to push the matter. It is hoped that Fairview or Rockwood will take the initiative and cause meetings to be called in each district and jointly to take it up. There are at least 50 pupils in these districts who would attend school. The taxation would not fall heavily on any because Troutdale alone has 43 per cent of her school tax paid by the railroads, etc.

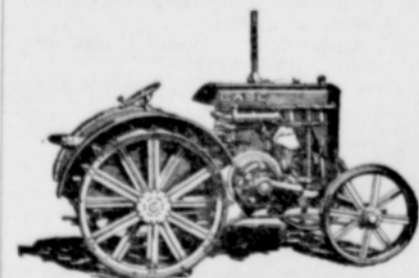
