they became due. On the present valuation the levy for this purpose would be 1 1/2 mills. As the town valuation increases the levy would grow less.

The recorder referred to the fact that the total levy in Portland last year amounted to 12.80 mills; in Troutdale, 13.80 mills; in Fairview, 7.80 mills; in Gresham 6.70 mills.

This question of raising a sinking fund will be discussed at the town caucus and the question will probably be placed in some form on the ballot to be voted November 2.

It was arranged that the town caucus, for nomination of candidates for city offices, will be held in Metzger's hall, Monday night, October 18 at 8 o'clock.

There are to be nominated one or more candidates for the following offices—Mayor, recorder, treasurer, marshal, and three councilmen. The three councilmen holding over are, Al Hammar, T. R. Howitt, B. L. Walrad. Those whose terms expire are, J. E. Metzger, E. H. Kelly, Wm. C. Metzger.

At the council meeting Tuesday night the resignation of Marshal D. G. Geddes was read and accepted. The council elected G. A. Cox, with the approval of the mayor, and Mr. Cox was immediately sworn in.

It is proposed to discuss at the caucus, on October 18, some charter amendments, among them one to make the marshal's office elective by the council, on nomination of the mayor or subject to approval of the mayor.

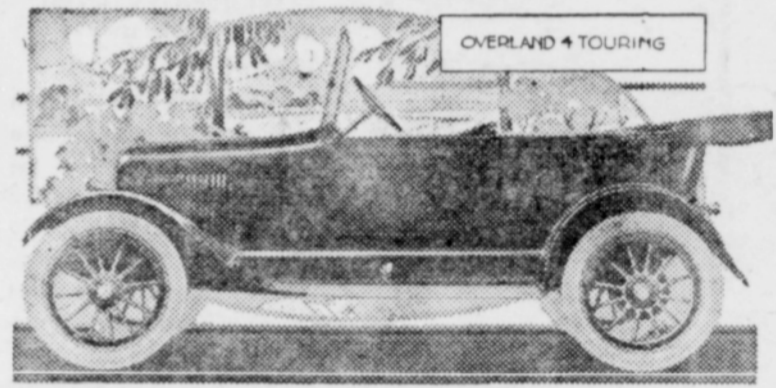
