MR. ALDERSON ALONE IS AT FAULT.

Are officials elected to do as they please or to carry out the wishes of the people?

An important case showing the failure of an officer to perform his duty is that reported in today's Outlook, that of the injunction case against the district boundary board.

The case was brought into court and it was decided that the petition was faulty and the time of the notices being posted was short by four hours. Whose fault was this? The peoples? No, but the matter was in the hands of W. C. Alderson the county school superintendent, who prepared a sample petition and sent it to K. A. Miller, clerk of the union district, and the latter made a copy from this petition and sent it to Fairview. Mr. Miller supposed that the man at the head of the school system in Multnomah county should be sufficiently informed on school law to put into the petition the things specified by law.

He did not question his honesty or ability and supposing the petition correct posted the notices of election as ordered by the district boundary board. This order was not received by the clerk of district No. 2 until the evening of the ninth of September and the other districts in question could not get their order before some time the next day. Now, Mr. Alderson admitted on the witness stand that the district boundary board ordered him on the 30th of August to send the notices out to the districts allowing their petition and advising the clerks to post the notices. What was he doing those 10 days? Do the taxpayers pay him to sit in his office and obey an order at his leisure? Surely with the help of a deputy the schools outside of Portland should not take up so much of his time that he would be unable for 10 days to send the notices as ordered by the district boundary board.

Investigations seem to show that the one entirely at fault is Mr. Alderson who by failing to do his duty and not knowing the petitions were incorrect, caused the will of the people to be thwarted.

Charity can go a long way in excusing a person for unintentional errors. Were it not known that Mr. Alderson was opposed to any additions to Union High school district, his failures and omissions in this case could be more easily excused.
