**OUTLOOK'S LEASED WIRE BRINGS ELECTION NEWS**

How the election returns came to Gresham is an interesting story. Tuesday evening the telephone operators were besieged with calls for the Outlook office and they were persistently told that 701 was busy on long distance. This was perfectly true, for the Outlook's phone held uninterrupted communication with Portland until near midnight.

Representatives of the Outlook secured a room and telephone in the Journal building, in Portland, through the courtesy of Dr. E. C. Rossman and Dr. G. M. Hoffman, dentists in that building. They were so located that the Journal's big bulletin board could be easily seen. As soon as a message was flashed on the screen it was read into the telephone and was quickly taken down by a force at work in the Outlook office, where the information was placed on a bulletin board and sent at once to the Gresham Theater. There the messages were transferred to films and thrown on the screen. H. W. Adrian, proprietor of the theater, put on a number of short reels which kept the crowd interested while waiting for election news. The crowds at the picture show and around the Outlook office showed their appreciation of the opportunity of getting returns directly from Portland without delay.

**BRYAN BLAMES THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS**

Wm. J. Bryan in discussing the late election from the League of Nation standpoint said the following:

"The American people want the government to play its part in the abolition of war, but they are indifferent as to whether we are part of a league or part of an association of nations. There is nothing in a name but everything in a sentiment. The real issue presented by the democratic party was not whether we should co-operate with other nations interested in peace, but whether we should assume a moral obligation which had no weight except as it suspended the right of congress to act independently when the time arrived for action. The nation will do its part in aiding to prevent war, but it will not surrender into the keeping of any foreign group the right to determine when we shall declare war.

These are the sentiments of most of the American people as was shown November 2d.

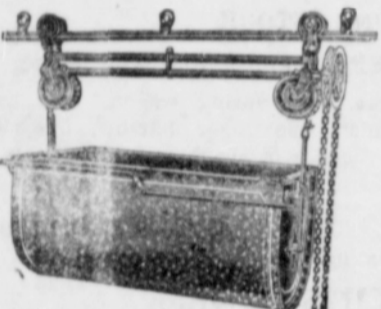
