A minister from Portland will preach at the Baptist church next Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. Sunday school will meet as usual at 10. A cordial invitation is extended.

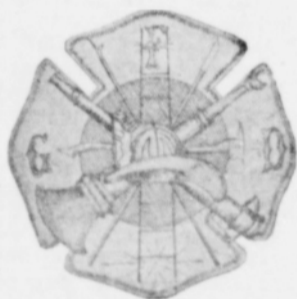

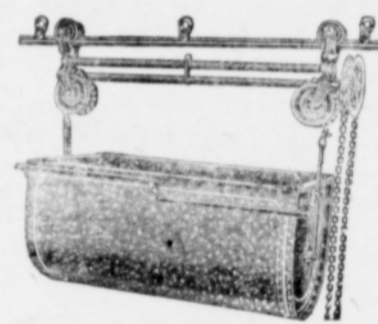
