THE INCREASE IN AUTOS.

Because of publication work done for M. O. Wilkins, publisher of the Automobile Record, covering the entire Oregon registration of motor vehicles, the Outlook has kept in close touch with the increase in automobiles in Oregon.

An automobile census for the United States is given in a recent issue of the Literary Digest. It gives the number of licensed autos in each state on January 1, 1920, and on that basis figures the number of persons per auto in each state.

These figures are not the latest but are probably relatively correct at this time near the close of 1920.

The registration given for Oregon January 1, 1920, is 83,332. This is short of last year's total and so far this year Oregon's registration has gone up to about 102,000.

TWO MEN.

"We've got a real job ahead, and we'll tackle it together." This information was sent by long distance telephone to Vice President-elect Coolidge by Warren G. Harding after his election had been confirmed.

This was expected of Mr. Harding, for even those opposed to him politically speak of him as being sincere. That reputation was strengthened all through the campaign.

Never before in the history of the nation was it so appropriate for a president-elect to take the stand as has the present one in regard to working with his colleague, for the last seven years the nation has been made to feel the need of a closer connection between the executive and the legislature, and for this service Mr. Coolidge is admirably adapted.

It seems paradoxical almost that two such men as these could be chosen to the highest places in our government, but this is not a step toward personal government but away from it.

The nation has full confidence in the men they have elected that they are able to, tackle it together and it will watch with interest the tackling of the job and its completion.

One thing noticeable is that while many prominent democrats have been mentioned in connection with the reorganization of the party there has so far been no mention of "Our George." Why such an oversight?

Again the apple has come into use, this time to make syrup. The Eugene factory in putting out a product that by some chemical action the acid that heretofore had been the objection to the syrup had been removed without altering the taste or food value.

This will be a great enterprise for the state for the small and waste apple that heretofore had gone to feed the hogs or some other stock that had no real food value to them will be used to satisfy the tasty palate of man.

By the new process, the apple syrup is clarified, the acid removed and then it is almost as sweet as the ordinary cane or beet syrup.

The Eugene plant is now making this syrup and it will be supplied to the trade this winter to give it a thorough test. It requires from seven to eight gallons of cider to make one gallon of syrup.
