EUROPE'S NEED: OUR SURPLUS

The Scientific American points out, basing its figures on statements made by E. M. Hurley, head of the shipping board, that this country has an eight hundred million dollar surplus in cotton, a six hundred million dollar surplus in wheat, a two hundred and fifty million dollar surplus in packing-house products, and a seven hundred and fifty million dollar surplus in finished and semi-finished manufactured materials and products of various kinds. These are available for export, we do not need them and Europe, especially western Europe, does need them badly. Moreover, we have the ships lying idle in our harbors for carrying these surplus products to the impoverished, famine-stricken peoples of the old world.

The trouble is these same needy people have not the gold which is demanded in payment for these necessities, the gold is most of it in this country already. This government has loaned more than ten billion dollars to European countries.

Financiers and economists are working on the problem. Millions of dollars are being subscribed and given to help in the relief of European sufferers. More is needed. Can we sit complacently by and let our surplus food spoil in this country when hundreds of thousands are dying of starvation across the water?

We need to broaden our conception of Christian charity and apply it as individuals and as a nation to present conditions.

FARMERS PLAN TO MARKET WHEAT CROPS.

There is every reason to believe that the American farmer will soon make a start in the experiment of marketing one of the country's greatest food commodities himself. The Farm Bureau Federations Committee of 17 are holding hearings on the question now, and before the winter is over we expect the announcement of a definite plan for marketing Uncle Sam's great annual wheat crop.

"Controlled marketing of wheat" is roughly what it will be. It will involve a multitude of details, but no doubt the high spots of the plan will be nearly as follows:

Two distinct organizations—one a marketing and the other a warehousing. The selling or marketing association of wheat producers may have state organizations, federated into a national exchange which may have the exclusive privilege of finally disposing of the crop. It tells the state organizations when and where to sell.

The warehousing may be by local, county or sectional companies with preferred and common stock. The preferred stock will pay dividends. Anybody can own this stock, but it has no vote. The common, or voting stock, shall be owned by the selling organization and pays no dividends.

Thus, many people who have money may be glad to invest their money in warehousing companies which will make reasonable profits out of the storage fees. But only wheat growers may be in the marketing organization, insuring absolute control to the producers.

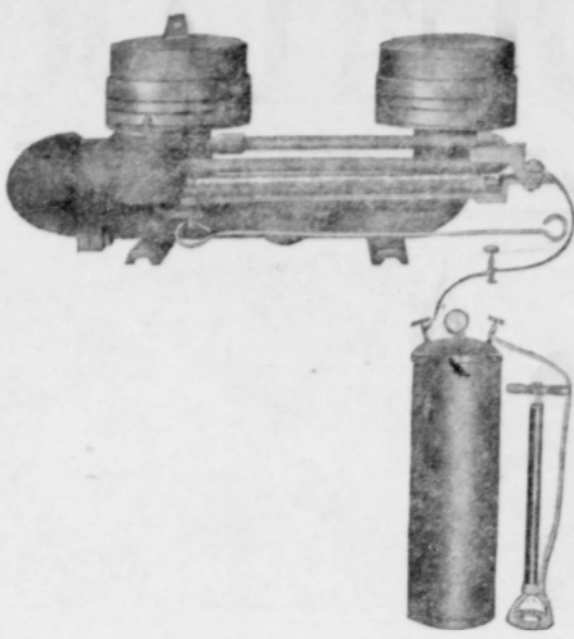
It is probable that no start will be made until 51 per cent of the country's wheat growers go in, contracting to turn over their crops to the association for five years. Fifty-one per cent will just about control the price of a crop.

We await with interest details of the plan as worked out by the Seventeen.

Clackamas County Farm Statistics.

Clackamas county shows gains in farms during the last ten years. According to the recent census the county now has 3836 farms, as compared with 3646 in 1910. The value of farm lands in the county was \$34,992,015 in 1920, as against \$26,969,404, a gain of \$8,022,611. Only 40 colored farmers operated in the county, and 3235 farms were operated either by owners or managers, and 601 by tenants. The crop yield for last year was: oats, 1,041,489 bushels; wheat, 659,632 bushels; hay, 52,700 tons; potatoes, 552,890 bushels. Domestic animals were reported as follows: Horses, 8409; mules, 150; cattle, 19,467; sheep, 16,780; swine, 20,291.
