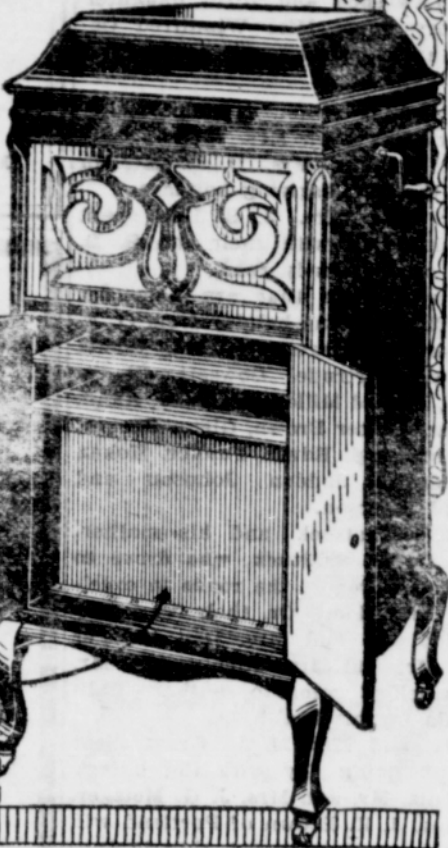

There is no question about it, that in time the two systems will become united, and as the M. & C. system is willing to meet us more than half way, it would be no more than reasonable to consider the matter.
