The state legislature is being asked for a fund of \$22,500 for the purpose of employing expert animal hunters who will be stationed at different points throughout the state. The 1919 session of the legislature appropriated \$5,000 for this work. Last year approximately \$2,200 was expended and approximately \$1,300 was realized from the sale of coyote skins and other furs taken from animals killed by these hunters. It is thought the project will be half self-tailing. In order to have this money available, it is suggested that the bounties on female coyotes be cut down from \$5 to \$4.

Voters May Restrain Dogs.

Oregon voters may keep dogs from running at large in any county, election precinct or city, by majority vote at any general or special election, points out Roy R. Hewett, of the O. A. C. political science department. The vote will be ordered on petition signed by 100 or more legal voters of county, 15 or more of election precinct, or 12 or more of incorporated town. If owners allow dogs to run at large unmuzzled after electors vote against it, they are subject to a fine of \$10 for first offence and \$25 for each succeeding offence. It is the duty of the law-enforcing officer to kill all dogs found at large unmuzzled.
