**Milk Prices to Be Lowered.**  
Beginning January 1st the price of a quart bottle of milk to the retailer was reduced half a cent. It is the intention of the city milk commissioner which decided upon this reduction that the reduced rate shall be passed on to the consumer.

The wholesale rate to producers was fixed at \$3.32 per 100 pounds. The price has been \$3.55. Quarts will be retailed at 14 cents and pints at nine cents. The wholesale price has been fixed at 12 1/2 cents for quarts and 7 1/2 cents for pints.
