The Farm Bureau Drive Is On. The farmers of Linn county are up and doing. Their drive for membership under the direction of the Oregon State Farm Bureau with George L. Gray of Missouri, organizer of the American Farm Bureau Federation in charge of the organization work and as one of the speakers. The first meetings of the weeks' speaking tour were held yesterday. Geo. L. Gray and A. C. Joy of Ashland, Jackson county, spoke at Shedd and Tangent. Geo. A. Mansfield, president of the state federation and W. J. Garner of Dallas, Polk county, at Providence and Crabtree.

No memberships are solicited at these meetings, which are purely educational in nature. This week, January 24-29, an intensive soliciting drive will follow by trained paid solicitors. The farmers of Linn county are thoroughly aroused and determined to remedy present conditions as shown by the enthusiasm manifested at the meetings held yesterday. It is confidently expected the Linn county will go over the top and have one of the largest Farm Bureaus in the state. The workers had a monster banquet at Albany on January 22, and on Saturday, February 5, a meeting will be held at the Albany Community House to organize Linn County's Greater Farm Bureau. This will be a big interesting meeting to which all farmers and others interested in the monument are invited.

Modern Crank Case Service.

"The average motorist," said J. E. With the first movement of the engine the process of oil contamination begins and it increases as operation continues until the oil becomes charged with dirt and loses its lubrication value.

Change Oil at Frequent Intervals.

"To keep the engine running at its best, change the oil in the crankcase as often as the manufacturer's instruction book says it should be changed. However, it is not sufficient to simply drain out the old oil, for that leaves deposits of dirt and badly contaminated oil in the crankcase to impair immediately the efficiency of the new supply of oil when it is poured into the crankcase. The whole operation must be most thorough.
