Bill Would Make New Plan

perintendent of public instruction may cause to be held, and to perform such other duties not inconsistent herewith as the district school board may prescribe. Section 17. Before assuming the duties of his office, the district school clerk shall give a good and sufficient bond as heretofore provided by law in districts of the first class. Section 18. It shall be the duty of the clerk of every school district to record all the proceedings of the district board meetings in book provided for that purpose, to give notice of all annual and special district board meetings, as heretofore provided by law, to make an annual report to the district according to the form prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction and to forward a certified copy of the same to the superintendent of the county school district within five days after the annual meeting of the district school board, to take the annual school census and forward a certified copy of the same to the superintendent of the county school district, and to perform such other duties not inconsistent herewith as the district school board may prescribe. Section 19. The district school board of each school district shall have the power to levy a tax once each year upon all real and personal property in such school district for the maintenance, operation, and support of the public elementary school system of said district and for acquiring or improving school sites. Section 20. On or before the last day of October of each year the district school board of each school district shall prepare a budget showing the amount of money which in the ensuing year for the maintenance, operation and support of all schools of the district and for acquiring or improving school sites—after deducting therefrom sums expected to be received from state-wide and county-wide taxes levied as heretofore provided by law or from other state or county funds. Section 21. The district school board shall give a reasonable opportunity for school electors to criticize the aforesaid budget at a meeting called for that purpose, as heretofore provided by law in districts of the first class. Section 22. When the district school board shall have finally determined upon the statement of expenses for the items indicated in the preceding sections, it shall be the duty of the clerk of the school district to report to the county clerk and county assessor on or before November first of each year the amount of tax levied by the district school board for the maintenance, operation and support of the public school system of said district, and for acquiring and improving school sites; provided, that the total levy for all school purposes in such district shall not exceed any limit heretofore prescribed by law unless such levy shall have been submitted to the school electors of such district at an election called as heretofore provided by law and shall have been approved by a majority of the electors voting in such election. Section 23. The district school board of each town school district or county school district shall have the power to create indebtedness for such district in the same manner subject to the same limitations as heretofore provided by law in districts of the first class, having a population of less than seventy-five thousand persons. Section 24. All moneys received from the state for use in any such county and all county school funds of such county shall be apportioned by the superintendent of the county school district among the several school districts of the county, if there be more than one, on the same pro rata basis as heretofore provided by law. Section 25. All laws relating to union high schools in force when this act becomes effective shall continue in full force and effect provided, that in each union high school district one member of the union high school board shall be elected from each subdistrict involved in said high school district, instead of one member from each district, as heretofore provided by law. Section 26. In any subdistrict of the county school district the local school committee shall have the power to organize and maintain a high school subject to the laws heretofore applying to the organization and maintenance of district high schools by school boards. Section 27. The office of county school superintendent is hereby abolished in each county in which this act shall become effective; provided, that the superintendent of the county school district shall hereafter be the custodian of the records heretofore preserved by the county school superintendent and of all reports which may hereafter be forwarded to him in accordance with the provisions of this act; provided further, that the superintendent of the county school district shall hold examinations for the benefit of all teachers within the county, said examinations to be under the control and direction of the state board of education. Section 28. In any such county, the district boundary board shall hereafter consist of the county court or the county commissioners in any county in which such commissioners are a separate body. Section 29. In the event that this act become effective in any county having a joint district with any other county or counties the district boundary board of all counties in which such joint district is located shall divide and apportion the territory of such school district. Section 30. All acts or parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed; provided, however, that all general laws of the state relating to public schools shall be applicable to all districts created under this act, and that all laws relating to districts of the first class shall be applicable to city districts formed according to this act, except in so far as the same may be in conflict with the provisions hereof. Section 31. Provided, however, that this act shall not become effective in any county of the state until the same shall have been regularly submitted to the voters of such county at a general or special election and a majority of the votes cast shall have been in favor of making such act effective; but the same shall become effective immediately in each county so adopting the same, irrespective of the adoption or rejection of the same in any other county or counties of the state. Section 32. The county court of any county at any general or special election in the county may, or upon the petition of not less than one hundred legal voters of the county, shall submit to the legal voters of the county the question whether this act shall become effective in said county; provided, that the county court of any county in the state may, or upon the presentation of a petition of not less than one hundred legal voters of the county, shall call a special election for this purpose, to be held on the first Monday in October, 1921, such special election to be conducted in accordance with the general election laws now in force in this state. Section 33. Whenever the question of making this act effective in any county shall have been submitted as hereinbefore set forth to the county court shall immediately thereafter canvass the votes and if it finds that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of making this act effective, the county court shall forthwith declare the measure carried and the act in full force and effect.

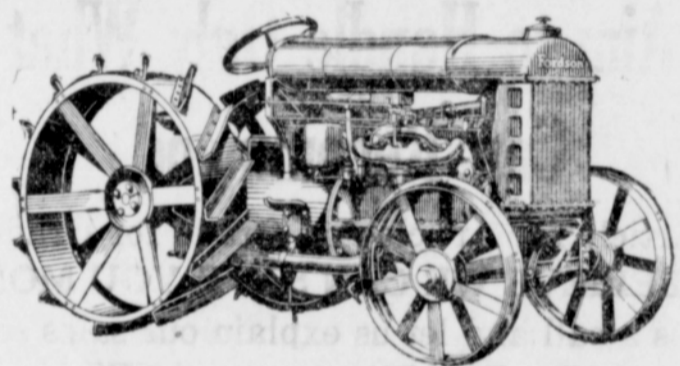
