EIGHT-YEAR-OLD BOY DIES SUDDENLY MONDAY

The Pleasant Home community was shocked and saddened Monday morning when news spread that Everett Collins, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Collins, had died suddenly.

Everett had not been ill and had seemed in his usual health and spirits Sunday afternoon with his brother he enjoyed the snowstorm and opportunities of snowball fights and there was no preparation for the blow that came Monday when the death angel claimed him so suddenly. He got up as usual in the morning and was dressing for school when he first complained of a sore throat. Examination disclosed no signs of sore throat and by that time he complained that his stomach hurt. It was thought that he was slightly bilious and he vomited a very little, then lapsed into unconsciousness from which he never rallied. Dr. H. V. Adix was summoned from Gresham and everything possible was done but death had claimed him before the doctor arrived. Dr. Adix pronounced it heart trouble.

His father, who had gone to his work only a short time before, was sent for and arrived home about two hours after the little lad's death. Neighbors and friends gave all the assistance possible but there was very little that could be done as it was hardly a half hour from the time he first complained of feeling bad until he had passed away.

He leaves to mourn his early departure his father and mother, a brother Freelin, two sister, Zelma and Helen and a host of relatives and friends who extend their warmest sympathy to the bereaved ones.

The funeral services will be conducted from the Methodist church at Pleasant Home Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The pastor, Rev. Earl B. Cotton, will have charge of the services.
