

COUNCIL CONSIDERS PROBLEMS;
PASSES EMERGENCY ORDINANCE

Chickens and poultry raising caused a live discussion in the town council meeting Tuesday evening and the discussion lasted for some time.

The discussion started when a petition from residents and property owners of Wallula Heights was read asking that the council take action to relieve the conditions existing there.

The petition is as follows:

Whereas, It has been brought to the attention of the undersigned that certain persons are attempting to establish and maintain quarters for the keeping and rearing of large numbers of chickens and other fowls within the town of Gresham and especially within the residence district known as Wallula Heights, an addition to the town of Gresham, and,

Whereas, the keeping, rearing and maintaining and threatened keeping, rearing and maintaining of large numbers of chickens and other fowls in residence districts and especially within the residence district of Wallula Heights will, and has, resulted in a marked and serious depreciation in the value of property in and immediately adjacent to the said Wallula Heights addition, and,

Whereas, the keeping, rearing or maintaining of large numbers of chickens or other fowls within the residence districts of the town of Gresham and especially within the said district of Wallula Heights will, in the opinion of the undersigned, result in serious unsanitary conditions and create a condition that will make the district within and immediately adjacent to the said Wallula Heights addition to a considerable extent untenable as a residence district.

Now therefore, we, the undersigned, respectfully petition your Honorable Body to enact such ordinance or ordinances as may be necessary to prohibit the keeping, rearing or maintaining by any person, firm or corporation of more than 36 chickens at one time within the corporate limits of the town of Gresham.

After the petition was read and discussed an ordinance regulating the poultry industry in the city limits was given the first and second readings.

The ordinance provides that no one can keep more than 36 chickens or other fowls in Wallula Heights addition. There is one variation to the effect that unless objection is made by more than 75 per cent of the people in the district that one may keep more than 36 chickens provided all buildings be at least 50 feet from property line and 50 feet from the public street.

The second ordinance which also received the first and second readings prohibits the keeping chickens in any building closer than 10 feet to the property and 25 feet from a public street. The ordinance also provides for the prohibiting of the erection or maintaining of any private garage or barn nearer than 20 feet to any public street, provided, however, that in the case of barns or garages already constructed that the owners have six months in which to move such buildings. The object of this is not to work a hardship on those who have such buildings erected on their property.

Both these ordinances will be given their final reading at the next regular meeting of the council.

The poolroom men asked to be given permission to install future-scope machines. There was some difference of opinion as to whether or not these machines would come in the same class as slot machines and the recorder was instructed to take

the matter up with the district attorney's office and get an opinion on the matter. If he gives his consent permission will be granted by the council.

An ordinance was ordered prepared covering the license on billiard and pool tables. The ordinance to provide for a license of \$2.50 per quarter on each table.

There has been much comment to the effect that minors are seen in the pool halls and it has been found in many cases that it was impossible to the pool hall proprietors to know whether or not the 18 or 20 year old boy was or was not 21 years of age. In order to ascertain whether or not the law was being complied with the council ordered affidavits to be prepared and left with the pool room proprietors and any boys of whom they have any doubt will be asked to sign this affidavit certifying that he is of age. A check can then be made and any one who swears falsely will be laying himself open to the charge of perjury.

Recorder Schneider was instructed to take up with the city attorney's office in Oregon City the matter of licensing bread wagons from the outside. These wagons while making regular trips here pay no taxes, license fees, etc. Oregon City has such an ordinance, a very close and strict one and it is being enforced and the council is considering taking a similar action.

The city engineer was ordered to fix the sidewalk grades on Powell street from the east to west city limits. Only at a few cross streets has this grade ever been set and it is planned to make the grades now for the whole street.

The sidewalks on South Main street for a block below Powell to be put into shape and the proper grades made as soon as possible. Two carloads of gravel were ordered for street improvements.

At the last regular meeting of the council an ordinance was passed amending section one of Ordinance 18 and an emergency was declared, the ordinance to take effect immediately upon the approval of the mayor.

The provisions of the ordinance are that "It shall be unlawful for any person to roam about the streets of the town of Gresham at night after 12 o'clock without having lawful business upon the streets at that time." It provides that upon conviction of this offense, such person shall "be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50 or by imprisonment in the town jail not less than two or more than 25 days. The council adjourned to meet Friday, March 11.

TO BEGIN NEXT WEEK

The speaking campaign for the Farm Bureau closes tonight with a meeting at Fairview where Geo. A. Mansfield will present the aims and plans of the Farm Bureau work.

A live interest has been aroused in the county and it is expected that the county will respond well in the membership drive which starts Monday.

The county has been completely organized and divided into sections for the membership canvass.

All the counties which have closed their campaign report that about 90 per cent of the farmers have joined.

Clackamas county added 1800 members to the organization during their membership drive last week.

H. A. Lewis, who is county captain of the Multnomah membership drive, has selected the following chairmen to head the local committees. The county has been divided into areas, one chairman in each area:

HOLSTEIN COW IS
GAINING ON RECORD

Gresham, Ore., March 3, 1921.—Editor Outlook:—I noticed in your issue of March 1 an account of the performance of my Holstein Friesian cow. I appreciate this account very much but wish to make one correction, namely, that she produced 23,504 pounds butterfat, equal to 29.38 pounds butter instead of 28.13 pounds as stated in your account.

Since the closing of the test, however, the cow produced 849.6 pounds milk in 28 consecutive milkings as against 761.6 pounds during the period of official testing. The cow is now being continued on yearly official testing, and she bids well to establish a new and distinct record for this time, of any cow, any age or breed in this state. Her largest 24-hour production so far being 130.2 pounds. H. G. MULLENHOFF.
