ANOTHER HOLSTEIN
PROVES HIGH PRODUCER

A. H. Burns of the Victory neighborhood received a letter Tuesday from the Carnation Stock Farm near Seattle informing him that a cow he sold them a year ago last fall had made a wonderful record for milk production during the year. This cow, Queen Carrie Johanna, is a four-year-old and was grand champion female at the Multnomah county fair a few years ago.

The record for 365 days gives Queen Carrie Johanna credit for 27,339.5 pounds of milk or an average of nearly 74.9 pounds of milk per day for the year. The butter for the year totaled 1007.9 pounds or about three pounds daily.

This cow typifies the aim which Mr. Burns has been holding as his goal, type plus production. One of the remarkable features of this cow's record was that it was made under

unusual conditions. Although this animal has had three calves she has never been dry from the time she freshened in January 1918 and no efforts were spared to give her a resting period but to no avail. This detracts from her ability to make show records and makes her present record the more unusual.

Multnomah county is producing some fine cows and the records are being moved up notch by notch as the breeders develop their herds.

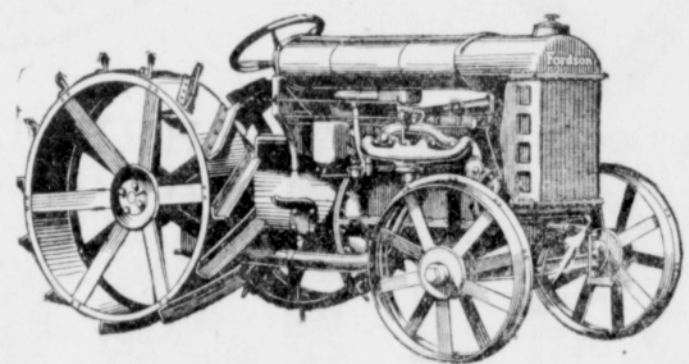
