Mrs. Elizabeth Morgan and Mrs. Geo. Chamberlain were Portland visitors Saturday.

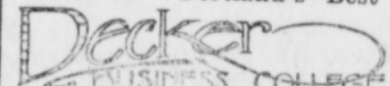
The youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Chamberlain is very ill.
