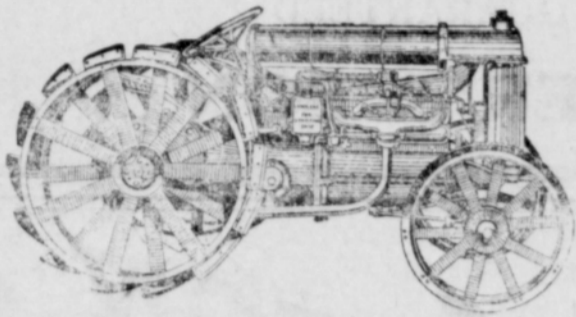


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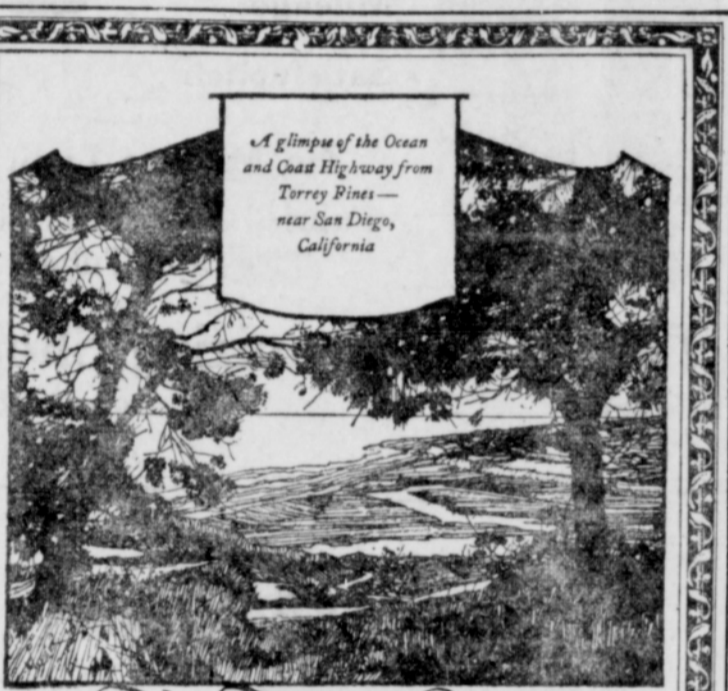


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A glimpse of the Ocean and Coast Highway from Torrey Pines—near San Diego, California

THE TORREY PINES are found only within a very limited area near San Diego and Del Mar, California, and on Santa Rosa Island. They are unusual because of their peculiar cones, their very large needles and their picturesque growth.

The motorist traveling the Coast Highway between San Diego and Los Angeles passes through this interesting spot—which the city of San Diego has protected by an extensive municipal park.

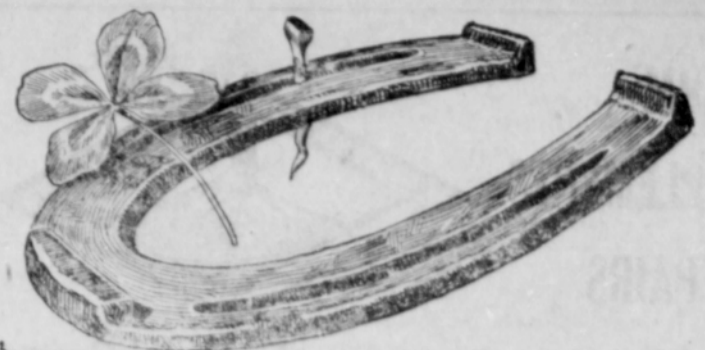
Miss Mildred Johnson was a Portland visitor Thursday.
