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H. G. MULLENHOFF'S COW HOLDS COAST RECORD

Stanhope Belle Johanna No. 282-677, the Holstein-Friesian cow owned by H. G. Mullenhoff, has broken the seven-day record of Segis Pietertje Prospect, the carnation cream cow who recently smashed the world's record for milk production during the year. Her record for the year was 37,381.4 pounds.

The local cow's latest record for a seven-day period is 844 pounds of milk and this is higher than the champion's record for a seven-day period. Stanhope Belle Johanne now holds the Pacific coast record for milk production, having produced more milk in seven days than any living cow on the coast. Unofficial records place the butter record at 31.7 pounds of butter for the week. The cow is gaining on her own record with the coming of more settled weather and the butterfat record is gradually climbing. During the past few days she has climbed to better than four pounds of butter in one day, and she is still increasing. Her highest butterfat record is 3.8 pounds for the day.

This cow is six years old and just beginning to reach her prime.
