### FARM BUREAU MEETING IS HELD AT UNION

S. A. Roberts, the chairman of the local Farm Bureau, called his committee together at his home to work out a plan of work to present to the community meeting, which is to be held in the near future.

Mr. Holt, our new county agent, was present and assisted in planning the work. He told of the various projects that are being taken up in other communities, and recommended that we take up only the most urgent ones at present, and make a good showing on the few before taking up more. The marketing project seemed to be of the most vital importance, and it was divided into two classes, the buying and selling. Under the head of buying, dairy feed and twine markets are to be explored, and under the head of selling a starter is to be made with potatoes. It will be too late to sell the 1920 crop through the Farm Bureau, but it takes time to get such a project started, so it will be none too soon to begin now to organize for the sale of this year's crop. The dairymen's league has charge of selling dairy products; the wheat growers union does the same with grain; the berry growers with berries, so it is time for the potato growers to form a union, and the Farm Bureau is the best medium through which this may be done.

The home demonstration project will also be recommended, the poultry project, and the rodent and thistle projects.

The temporary chairman is authorized to call a meeting for the evening of Thursday, April 21, at 8 o'clock, the place of meeting to be announced later. It is purposed to make this an open meeting for everybody who is interested in getting the best out of farming for the farmer and his family.

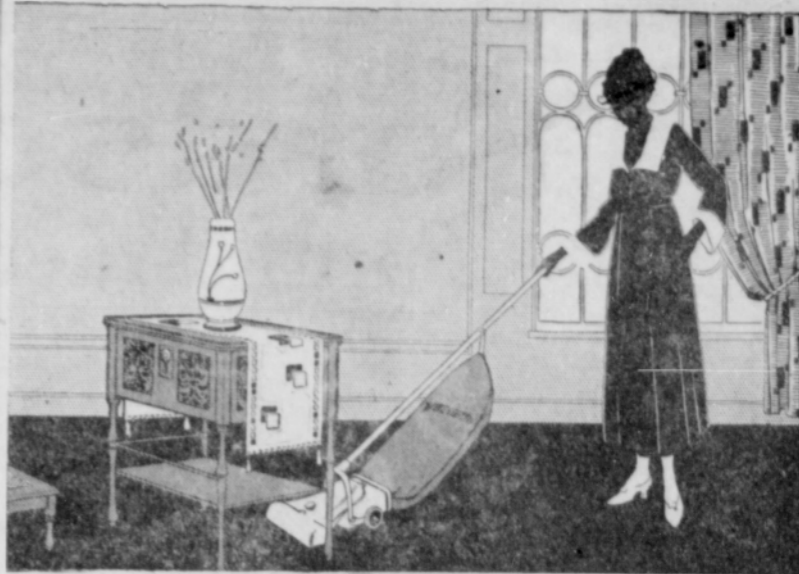
E. M. Stone, who has been living on the Stone farm on the Sandy road, has moved onto the Townsend farm here. There are 40 acres in this place.

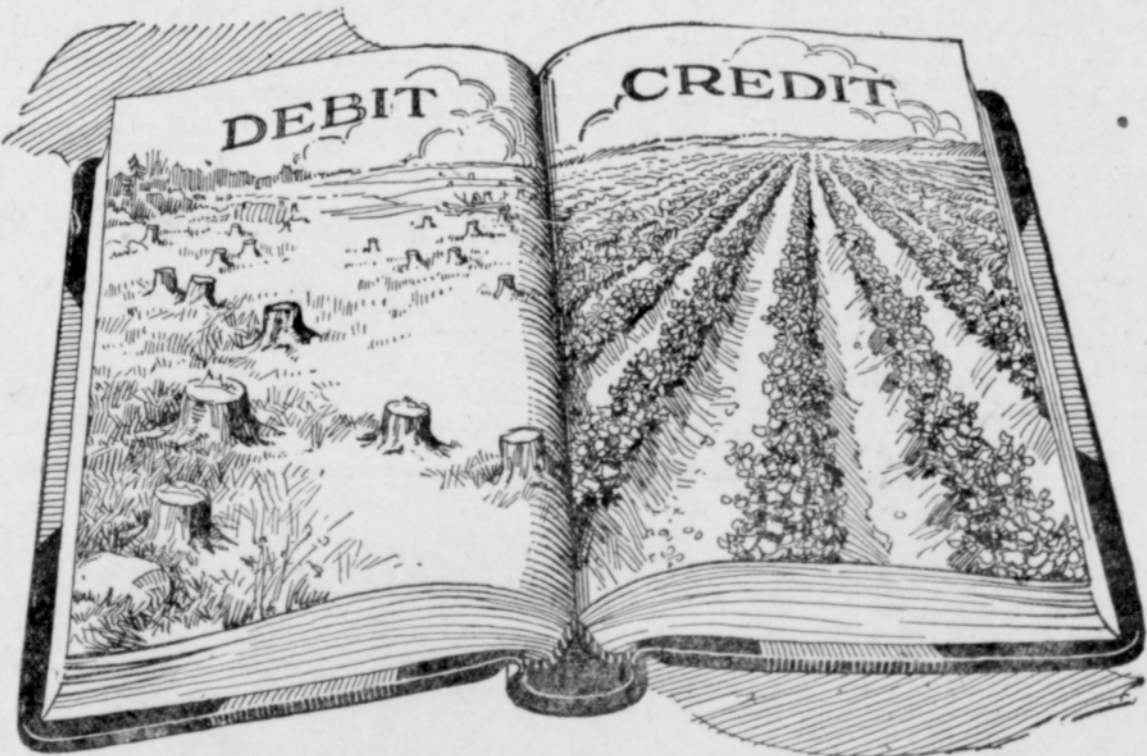
