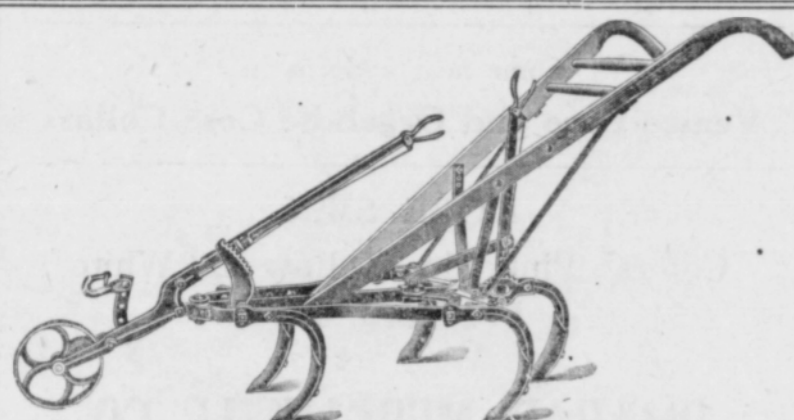

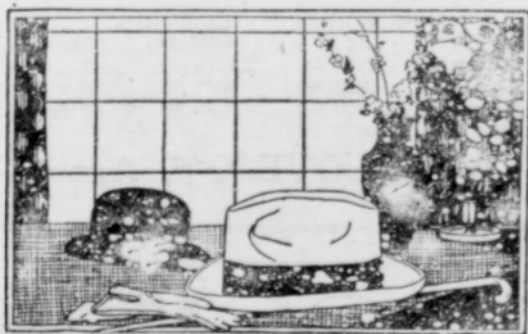

HOME-MAKING PROJECT IS PROVING POPULAR

The Home-Making club of Powell Valley held a most successful social Friday evening at which they raised about \$32.00 which added to the funds they already had will almost pay the expenses of two delegates to the O. A. C. summer school.

The demonstrations which members of the club gave were splendid. Miss Marion Hagberg gave a splendid paper on the control of the house fly. The paper was well written, well read, and of a practical nature. She had chosen facts and methods that apply to conditions in the country and on the farm.

Miss Edith Taylor gave a demonstration of the correct method of making a bed and gave a number of pointers about the arrangement of the coverings and pillows which give an attractive appearance to the bed.

An iceless refrigerator was demonstrated by Miss Minnie Danielson, who explained the refrigerator and told of the cost of the various items which totaled a little more than \$2. A screen food safe is covered with canton flannel cover and a pan of water placed on top with wicks of canton flannel leading down onto the covering of canton flannel.

The water is syphoned from the pan down the sides of the safe and the evaporation keeps the food cool. The best location is in a windy place where the evaporation is rapid. The safe may be set in the sun without injuring its effectiveness. The main element is the evaporation of water.

Miss Etta Anderson gave a demonstration of the use of a furniture polish and cleaner which the girls prepared recently according to directions given by the Oregon Agricultural College.

A number of musical numbers added to the program and were much enjoyed.

This is the only Home Makers club in Multnomah county and is proving most successful. The girls are very much interested in the work and several of the girls are now responsible for the care of their father's homes and most of the others are the "right at hand" helpers of their mothers.

The course which is given by the college is arranged to give the girls a higher viewpoint of housework than that of drudgery and the aim is to make household efficiency tend toward home makers rather than housekeepers. While there are many helpful ideas learned during the course the main principal is the inspiration gained to make use of the many helps that are available for home makers and to inspire the girls toward new ideals of home making.

The father's of the community have expressed themselves as heartily in favor of the new project and proclaim it the best club feature that has been taken up in the district.

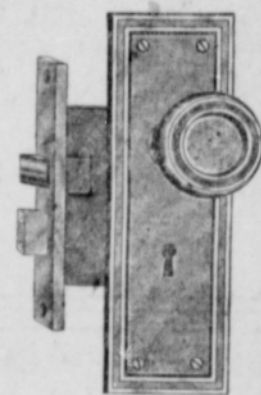
