\$400 FOR LITTERS AT INTERNATIONAL FAIR.

"Grow, grow, grow a pig
Fatter every day
Merrily, merrily, cheerily, cheerily,
Growing a pig will pay."

This is the slogan of the Multnomah county pig club. The county club leader offers the following as encouragement to pig club members through the Farm Bureau News:

Never before have the livestock clubs been so liberally supported locally and in the state. Feeds are cheaper and with the abundance of cull potatoes, pigs can be grown with a profit outside of the support given at the fairs.

The fair board has doubled the amounts given previously. Kerr, Gifford's, Fisher's and Albers' feed companies are giving 100-lb. sacks to each of the best hogs exhibited in each division, of each breed. Ten dollars is being given for the hog showing contest by the First State Bank.

At the State Fair, breeds will be judged separately which will mean three times as much money as previously given.

We have received an appropriation of \$400 for a contest in which an entire litter of pigs will be fed for market and exhibited in November at the Pacific International. The buyers will give top prices for these at the close of the show. Multnomah county boys ought to be interested in this contest, since shipping is no problem with us and the prizes will be \$40 or \$50 each, thus assuring a return for the cost of exhibiting.

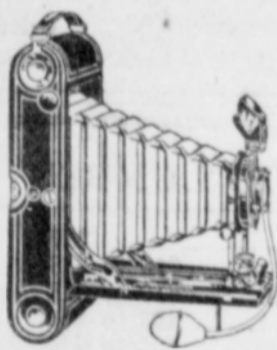
