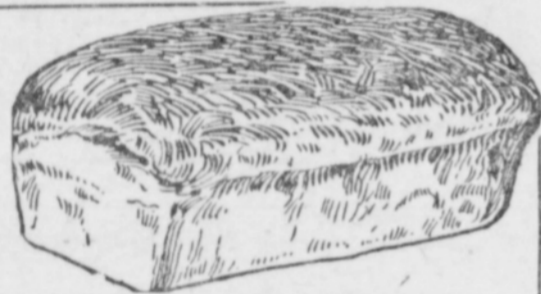

### Vegetable List Offered.

The season in which the vegetable matures should be considered in choosing varieties of vegetables. This applies especially to cabbage, cauliflower, and sweet corn. In choosing varieties of lettuce, solidity and crispness are important factors to look for. Beets having good red interior color should be chosen. With squash, dryness and good flavor should determine choice. Choice of beans should be determined by freedom from stringiness. These various things have been taken into consideration in making up a list of varieties for the home garden. A copy of this list can be obtained from the college exchange at the Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis.

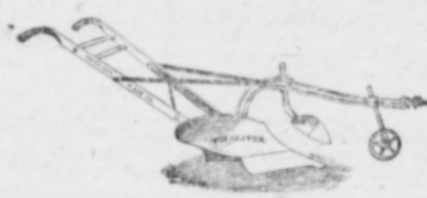
