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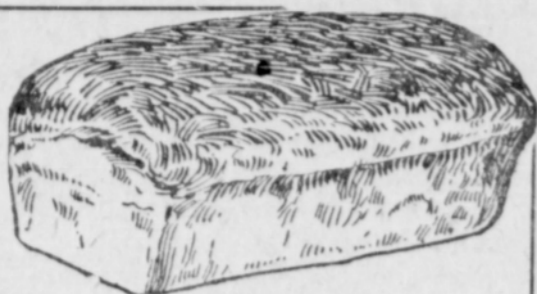

### COUNTY HEALTH WORK PROGRESSING NICELY

The Multnomah County Public Health Nurse association met at the courthouse in Portland Saturday in its annual session and outlined plans for extension during the coming year.

Mrs. Ruth Young Gould, county public health nurse, presented a report of the work in Multnomah county during the past year and outlined the possibilities for further development and service among the children and the sick in the rural districts of the county.

Mrs. Gould reported that a total of 1864 children out of the 2596 in the county outside of Portland were examined during the year and that defects ranging from those of vision and hearing to physical deformity were found and a record of 50 per cent of corrections attained.

This record is especially fine considering the fact that Mrs. Gould organized the county work last year and was compelled to win her way against the disapproval of many of the parents who resented the visits of the nurse as intrusions. A different feeling is abroad in the county at present where the county nurse can hardly keep up with the call and demands for her help and time.

Mrs. Gould has resigned as county nurse and will go east with her husband, an engineer, who has been assigned to work in Illinois.

Miss Mary Billmeyer, a graduate of the Presbyterian hospital, Chicago, and recently connected with the county nursing work in Kalamazoo, Michigan, has arrived in Portland to take up the work that Mrs. Gould has so ably commenced.

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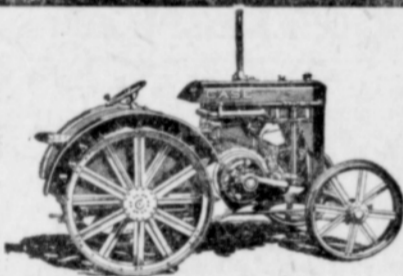
