Equal Taxation for All

The expected has happened. The King bill passed by the recent California legislature which heaped millions of dollars of additional taxation on a selected list of private industries including public service corporations, insurance companies and banks, has been attacked in the courts on a number of grounds including its constitutionality.

The case will have national interest in that it brings to a direct issue the right of a legislature to specify a limited number of persons or corporations who must produce the increased tax revenue demanded by enlarged state appropriations and expenditures, while the majority of citizens are not assessed any additional amount to meet the increased state expense.

As sugar prices come back to normal the American people appreciate more and more what it means to have a sugar industry established in this country.

When sugar went to the highest point following the war conditions 48 separate geographical divisions outside our own territory shipped sugar into this country.

Our country suffered less from shortage or extortion for the great sweetening life staple than any other because we have a great home sugar industry.

So long as the present disparity in money values exists, it operates as a direct bounty, encouraging the export of sugar from Europe to the United States.

This question of exchange is one of the serious problems that must be considered in any legislation affecting the tariff operations on sugar that Congress may adopt.

On the one hand, exchange can be restored to normal only by the United States taking from European countries commodities, gold or securities.

TWO APPLICANTS FOR GRESHAM POSTOFFICE

Business and Shipping It would not be entirely unreasonable to apply business principles in the solution of the problems of handling American shipping and building up a merchant marine in competition with the rest of the world.

And so thinks Jas. A. Farrell of the Foreign Trade Council and President of the United States Steel Corporation, who makes these concise statements in a recent address:

American exporters, importers and travelers should use American vessels.

The policy of using shipping board vessels to build up trade routes from every U. S. port should be abandoned in favor of running services only from ports where cargo is readily available.

The Shipping Board should withdraw from all but supervisory activity, and should charter its steamers on a bare-boat basis, or on time charter with option of purchase later.

The operation costs of American ships must be reduced to an equality with foreign costs.

Those U. S. Shipping Laws which impose on American ships a competitive disadvantage estimated at 5 per cent on the capital investment, must be repealed.

International agreement to stabilize shipping rates and to lay up a proportionate percentage of the tonnage owned by each nation, might be useful in solving the present situation.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that petitions have been presented to the Common Council of the Town of Gresham, Multnomah County, Oregon, requesting that the boundaries of the said Town of Gresham be changed so as to include new and additional territory within such boundaries, as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the North line of the Mount Hood Railway Company's right-of-way to the intersection of the Pipe Line road; thence West on the North side of said Pipe Line road to a point forty (40) Rods East of the center line of the Andrews road, thence South to the South East corner of the L. Crumb premises; thence West to the West line of the Andrews Road; thence South to the South East corner of the Mary S. Shoemaker premises; thence West to the Town limits of the Town of Gresham; thence North to the place of beginning, also.

Beginning at a point in the North line of the Town limits of the Town of Gresham 738 feet East of the center line of Main street; thence running North 2135 feet more or less to the North line of the M. A. Stubbs premises; thence West 798 feet more or less to the center of North Main Street; thence West 660 feet; thence South to the North line of the Town limits of the Town of Gresham; thence East and South, following the North limits of the Town of Gresham to the place of beginning.

M. to 7:00 P. M. on July 15, 1921, for the holding of said election.
