BUSINESS CONDITIONS.

"We are now paying prosperity's debt," is the way the Business Digest, organ of the United States National bank of Portland, explain the present financial situation.

It further says, it was human nature to run up bills during good times, and we did it. Now we are paying our bills under pressure. We borrowed fifty-two cent dollars, so to speak,—now we are repaying them with eighty-five cent dollars, and as prices continue to come down, it will be necessary to repay additional dollars obtained in boom times, with dollars which will be twice as hard to earn. Of course it is hard, and the worst is not over. Though prices have fallen greatly, there is still further deflation to be accomplished. We are paying the penalty for violating economic laws, and all are guilty from the Federal government down. Extravagance, perhaps justifiable under the necessity of winning the war, was the order of the day. For several years, figuratively speaking, we were borrowing ourselves rich. Now we suffer because we must pay back.

But our people are looking facts in the face. The country is not broke—it is merely bent. Common sense and hard work—honest work—thrift and economy will pull us out of the hole. It is time to take off our coats, go to work, take our medicine no matter how bitter, suffer our losses and benefit from our experience. There have been times before when financial conditions seemed almost hopeless, but always common sense has prevailed, and thus it will be again.

A slow but steady improvement in the business situation is taking place month by month. Fear of a financial collapse has entirely vanished, has given way to a feeling of quiet confidence that our industries, taken as a whole, are gradually bettering their condition. The existing credit strain is gradually relaxing, generally speaking. Banks the country over have reduced their borrowings from the Federal Reserve Bank to reasonable amounts, and within another ninety days, after the present large crops of the country have gone to market, there will be still further liquidation of credits. While it is true that deflation is far from its end, and that we cannot expect free and active business until the values of various commodities are nearer a parity, yet we must realize that prices are gradually reaching somewhere near pre-war normal.

AUTO ACCIDENTS RESULT IN MINOR INJURIES

The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Stanley received painful injuries when she was thrown from the seat in which she was riding with her mother last Sunday night. It was thought at first that the foot was broken but the injury proves to be a bad sprain. Mrs. Stanley was thrown backward into the wagon but was not hurt. Mr. and Mrs. Stanley were riding in a wagon at night and without lights but were keeping outside the road to be out of the way of the traffic. An approaching automobile was crowded off the road by another and hit the Stanleys' wagon.

Hall of Portland were in the car which was struck and Mrs. Hall was thrown through the wind shield but was unhurt.
