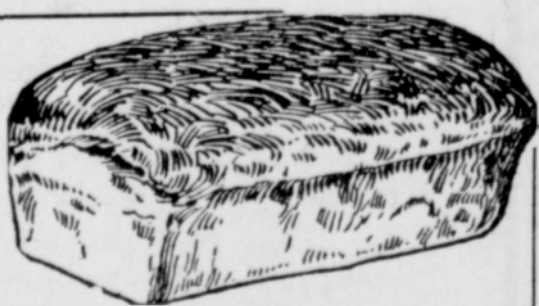

### UNIVERSITY OF OREGON SHOWS FINE GROWTH

The number of graduates of the University of Oregon has now reached a total of 2907, according to figures recently compiled by Miss Charlie Fenton, alumni secretary, for the new directory which will be published this fall. In addition there are 4000 former students who attended from one to three years but who did not complete their work for degrees.

These graduates and former students are scattered all over the world, but most of them are living in Oregon, returning to the state manifold the benefits received.

The university is only 45 years old. The first graduating class in 1878 had five members. The class graduated last June numbered 236.

If the age-old test of "By their fruits ye shall know them" applies to universities, the University of Oregon has good reason to be proud of its record, for the men and women who have gone out with its degree are now occupying important places in many walks of life. Bankers, judges, congressmen, writers, editors, diplomats, college presidents, high army officers and executives in big organizations are numbered among those who received their education at the university. One graduate has charge of the education for the American navy, one is on the general staff of the army in Washington, one represents this state in the national congress, one is president of Colorado College, one is vice-consul in the Netherlands, one is on the editorial staff of a national magazine. So it goes through a long list of eminent positions. If the opportunities for University of Oregon graduates in the future can be judged by those in the past, they are many and touch a multitude of activities.
