A NEW IDEA IN COLLEGE TRAINING.

To train the man who is to "be his own boss"; who will fill the place of proprietor, manager or administrator, rather than the place of a specialized employee—that is the new kind of job that is being taken up by colleges in this new day. This work has been given special notable attention in Antioch College, near Dayton, Ohio.

The young men and women students give half their time to their classes and half to doing real work, in real industry, enabling the student to pay a large part of the expense of his education while he is acquiring it, while at the same time he is getting the practical experience that any one must have who would master his calling.

It is the aim according to the college bulletin, to unite the fundamentals of a cultural education with the essentials of professional or technical training, so that while the student is becoming fitted for work in a profession or other vocation, he or she at the same time will be preparing for effective citizenship.

It is the lack of the practical mastery of his calling which frequently makes the professional or technical student so ineffective and helpless upon graduation, and which so commonly results in his spending several years, sometimes of nearly wasted effort, in finding himself. To assist the student to such practical mastery at the same time that he is learning the theory of his calling, the Antioch program provides that the professional or technical student may spend half his time at school and half in practical work, as nearly as possible along the lines of his proposed calling. To this end the students will alternate five weeks at school with five weeks at work. Cooperation has been arranged with nearby industries for the employment of students on this half-time basis. There are 500 industries within 30 miles of Antioch, though the college itself is in a quiet village.

The Oregon State Board of Vocation Training is carrying out the same idea in a somewhat limited sense, in its plan for the re-education of ex-service men. It gives them training a part of the time in the colleges and high schools of the state and places them for a part of the time on the farms and in various activities.

This method would have many advantages, especially to those students who begin their training late.

THAT "WET" PARADE.

The bad guessing of the "wets", who planned a big parade in New York City on July 4 which was intended to be a declaration of independence of existing laws, is now a matter of history. It is now known that the majority of Americans are law-abiding citizens. It is also certain that when they chose New York for their great demonstration, the wets chose a place as favorable as any in the United States.

The event had been advertised for weeks. The first headlines read: "250,000 People Will March Against the Dry Law". A little later the headlines read: "100,000 People Will Demonstrate Against Prohibition on July 4th."

On July 5th, after the gigantic affair had become a matter of history, the headlines read: "15,000 People Paraded Against Prohibition." Com-

ing down to absolute truth, according to Deets Picketts, 14,992 New Yorkers marched on July 4th to show the fool Americans that they consider themselves independent of the prohibition law or any other law which does not receive their approval.

There were something over 5,000,000 people in New York who did not march.

New "Bridge of the Gods" to Be Built.

It is reported from Vancouver, Washington, that a fine new structure of steel and concrete will be built across the Columbia river to replace the legendary, natural bridge which once connected the north and south banks of the river near Cascade Locks.

Tentative plans for the bridge have been approved by the war department and a franchise has been granted by congress, according to the prospectus issued by the new corporation.

The bridge will connect the Columbia River highway on the Oregon

side and the Evergreen highway on the Washington bank of the river, forming a scenic loop that will be unrivaled anywhere in the world, it is said.

The corporation known as the "Bridge of the Gods company" is capitalized at \$300,000, the estimated cost of the structure. Stock to the extent of \$125,000 will be sold to finance the first construction work.

As the bridge is to be financed by private capital, tolls will be charged and a tentative schedule has been worked out.

The bridge is to be about 1500 feet in length and will be built 1200 feet west of the Cascades.
