Here, in May, 1843, the Provisional Government was born, which held the American settlers together and laid the foundation for the final settlement with Great Britain which made all this great northwest a part of the United States instead of a British province.

Here every year memorial exercises are held and a memorial building and a monument mark the spot. On the latter are carved the names of those who took part in the memorable meeting so long ago.

A French-Canadian artist is caretaker of the place and has his studio in the building. He has a wonderful historical painting depicting the scene, which he has made from about 20 photographs of the heroes of the event, verbal descriptions of many more and a careful study of the history. This painting is in his studio and one must pay admission to see it, but it is well worth the price. Many other paintings of rare beauty are hung in the hall and may be seen by all.

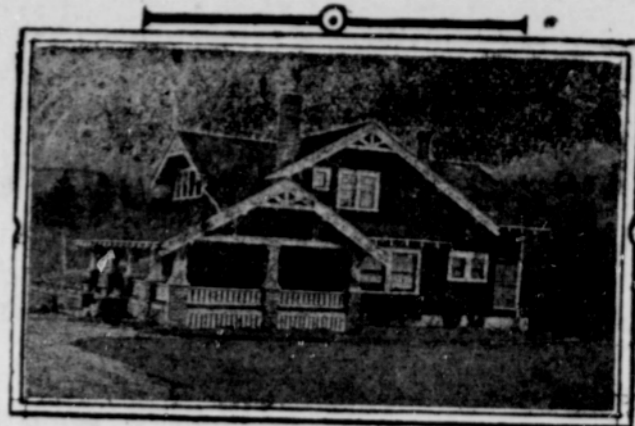
GUARANTORS CALLED OF CADMEAN CHAUTAUQUA
