BOYS ARE RECOVERING FROM SEVERE INJURIES

H. W. Strong came home from Albany last Wednesday and reported that his sons, Ray and Winston, were being cared for at a hospital at that place and that they seemed to be doing well.

Winston, 12 years of age, is suffering from concussion of the brain. Ray, 16 years old, has a broken collar bone and both have minor injuries as a result of the truck on which they were riding being struck by a fast train on the Southern Pacific track near Jefferson last Sunday.

Much anxiety was felt for Winston but his condition was reported favorable by his father, who returned to Albany on Wednesday night.

Mr. Strong states that the blame can without doubt be laid to the crew of the special freight train carrying the Folly circus, since four or five witnesses state that the train was going at a high rate of speed and that it gave no signal for the crossing. Ray, who was driving the truck, said that he looked first up the track in the direction from which the train was approaching but did not see it on account of its being hidden by a cut. He then looked the other way and supposing the track to be clear started across. The first that he knew of the train was when the pilot of the engine struck his machine and hurled it around, crumpling the front part and scattering the load. The boys were not thrown from the truck but were struck by the shattered timbers from the truck.

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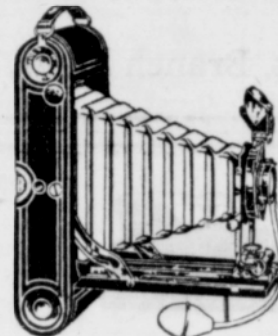


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
