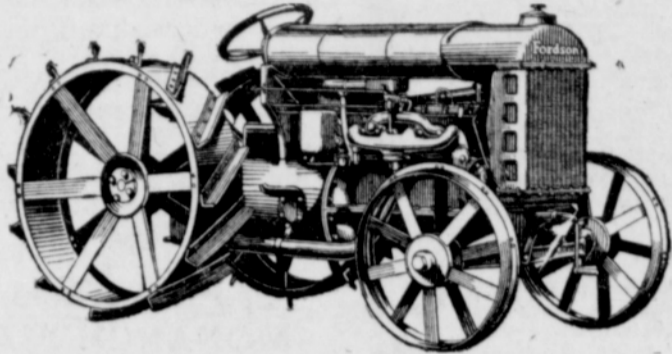

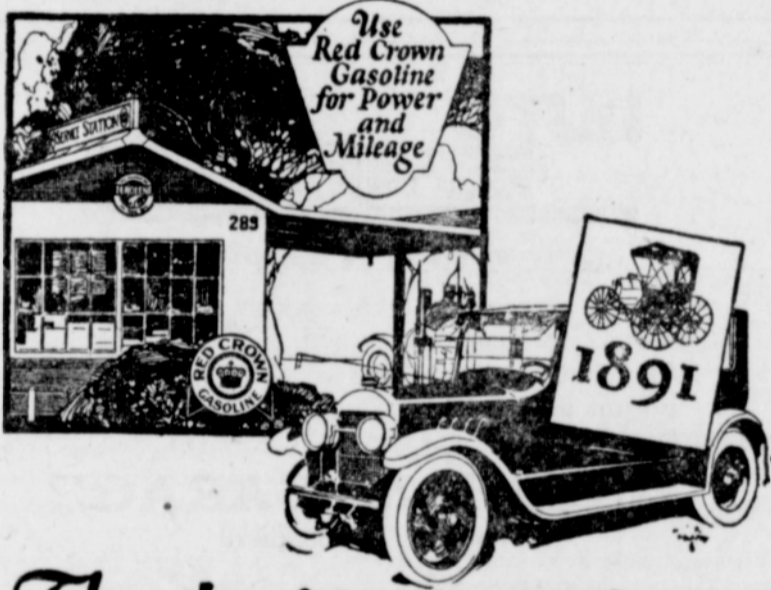

Of Interest to Bond Holders and the Public.

The United States Treasurer is now holding \$80,000,000 with which to pay interest to bond holders who have neglected to have their bonds exchanged for permanent bonds with interest coupons attached, or failed to detach from bonds which have interest coupons attached. More than 7,000,000 bonds are outstanding with no interest coupons attached.

This shows how careless people are regarding their bonds. Although much time and money has been spent in endeavoring to collect these bonds for exchange, notice having been given in many ways urging the people to look after the exchange of their bonds, more than 7,000,000 are yet to be exchanged.

If people would detach their interest coupons and deposit in the different banks, more than \$80,000,000 would be put in circulation at once, and thus tend to relieve the stringency in the money market.

There are no doubt many bond holders in this community who still have bonds without any interest coupons attached, who have failed to deliver to the banks for exchange. This should be done at once. Those who have interest coupons due should detach and deposit in banks for collection.

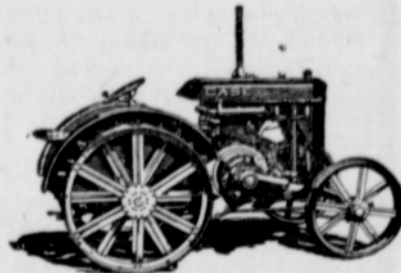

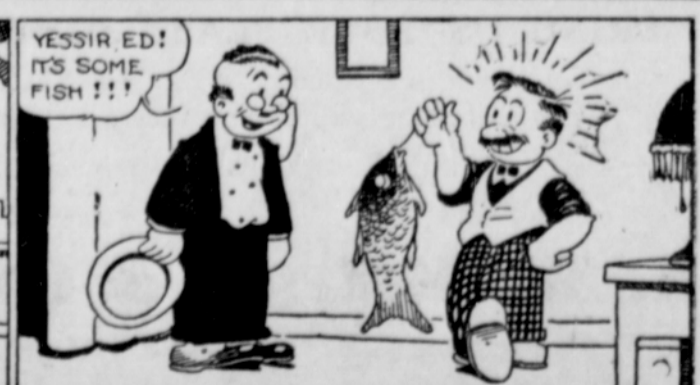
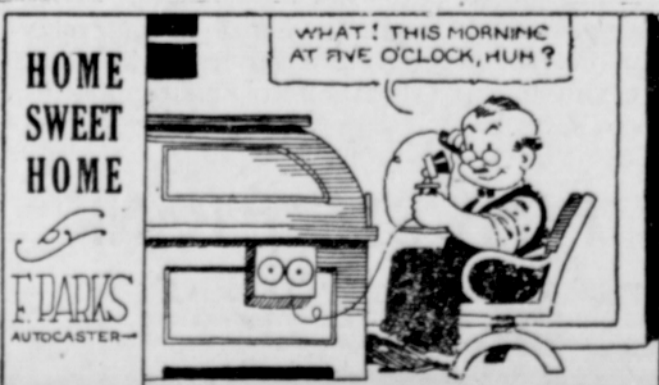
