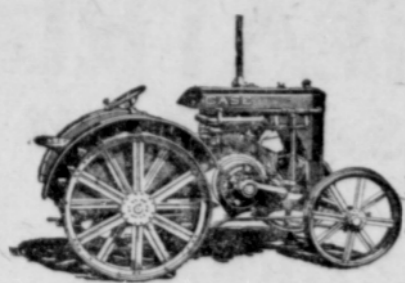


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PLEASANT HOME

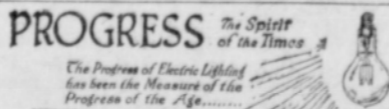

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PLEASANT HOME MEN CLIMB MOUNT HOOD

Rev. Earl B. Cotton and Chas. Williams of Anderson, Indiana, who has been spending the summer here with his brother D. T. Williams, enjoyed a trip to the summit of Mt. Hood last Tuesday and they are wearing the summit watch fobs which are won by those who make the trip.

They left Pleasant Home Monday morning and arrived at Government Camp at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. That same evening they climbed to the cabin where climbers spend the night before beginning the ascent. At 2 o'clock Tuesday morning they commenced climbing arriving at the top about 9 o'clock. They enjoyed the trip very much but were not rewarded with the wonder view that is visible early in the season when only the vision of the eye limits the view. They were able to see the foothills for probably 15 miles on all sides. The smoke, while not as bad as usual at this time of the year, is still thick enough to obscure the view of the Willamette valley and eastern Oregon fields.

Mr. Cotton and Mr. Williams visited the sand eruption which created such an excitement a few weeks ago and saw the sand but no evidences of heat. They explain it as being a water pocket which finally broke loose and pushed out sand which had accumulated during the years.

They left the summit a little after 10 and reached Government Camp at 2:20 and Pleasant Home the same evening.

Mr. Cotton says that with the completion of the Loop highway it will be possible to make the trip from here in 26 hours.

TROUTDALE

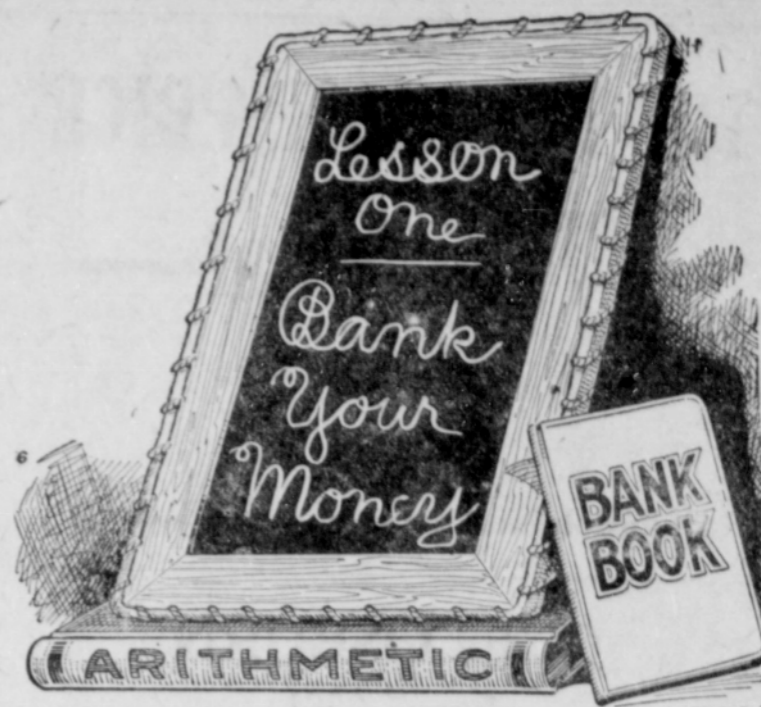
