CITIES AND INDEBTEDNESS.

According to statistics published by the Oregon Voter, covering all cities in Oregon, Fairview has an indebtedness of only \$200 and Gresham a total indebtedness of \$27,850, of which \$25.00 is bonded. On the basis of the last census this gives Gresham a debt of \$25.25 per capita, which isn't much although some cities are lower. Fairview's debt amounts to \$1.09 per capita, which is the lowest recorded. Portland's per capita debt is a little over \$100. The most heavily indebted city in Oregon in proportion to population is Warrenton whose bonded debt is \$734.25 per capita. The next is Prineville, \$336.54 per capita, and third comes Grass Valley with \$315.46 per capita. Gresham's total debt in proportion to assessed valuation (1920) is 3.86 per cent. That is relatively low. Portland's is 8.35 per cent, and Warrenton is only 17.50 per cent. The highest seems to be Prineville whose debt is 67.22 per cent of its assessed valuation and Scio is second with 55.56 per cent.

The Oregon Voter is in a class by itself. It has a way of presenting statistics graphically and interestingly. Its volumes become valuable books of reference, used by students of economics and officials generally. It is just as important for the average voter and citizen to study its pages.

100 YEARS OF PEACE.

Today, at Blaine, Washington, on the Canadian boundary line, is being dedicated an appropriate monument in celebration of the fact of 100 years of uninterrupted peace between the United States and Canada. This monument is on the Pacific highway and is at the gateway to that 2000-mile stretch of auto road extending through Washington, Oregon and California. It is now all graded and graveled, more than half surfaced and the program calls for its completion in 1923.

On the monument is the legend, "Open for 100 years." This highway traverses one of the most scenic and fertile sections of the whole United States. Along its course eleven snow-capped mountains may be seen. These are, from north to south, Baker, Rainier, St. Helens, Adams, Hood, Jefferson, Three Sisters, Shasta, Lassen, Whitney and Wilson.

FARMERS MUST ORGANIZE TO SOLVE MARKET PROBLEM

is the result of the digested and assimilated knowledge of the ages. Law has grown up as knowledge has increased." He then in a very vivid manner described the probable steps in the growth of agriculture from the time man first located a certain kind of fruit he liked, learning to find the fruit at its prime at certain seasons, later clearing away underbrush that he might locate the tree easier the next time, the noted improvement of fruit, after this process, the cultivation with sticks, the evolution of the plow and finally the tractor. "As the plow has evolved through the ages so has the law evolved. We can not go to another country and get their laws. We must evolve our own. The things to do is to understand our problems and find the solution."

Again he said that pains should be taken to develop leadership. "Follow up the program you have started here for the farmer must hold and control his produce by organization until it reaches the ultimate consumer."

"The problem of the farmers today is organization and education he said in conclusion and he advised all to take the opportunities at hand, encouraged all to send their boys to college to study these problems and also to come themselves.

At the conclusion Guy H. Robertson, secretary of the Multnomah County Farm Bureau, told of the work of the Farm Bureau especially emphasizing the national aspect and the many important victories which this organization has already won for the farmers. Mr. Robertson's statements were convincing and he read the outline of work accomplished the amount of which was a surprise to all who have not been following the situation closely.

S. B. Hall, county agent, spoke briefly on the general problem facing the farmers and emphasized the need for closer relations between the various phases of rural life and a better understanding of community spirit in all the various interests.
