Funeral services will be held in Gresham at the Methodist church, on Thursday afternoon, September 15, at 2:30. Interment will be in the Gresham cemetery beside his parents. A more extended obituary will appear in a later issue of the Outlook.

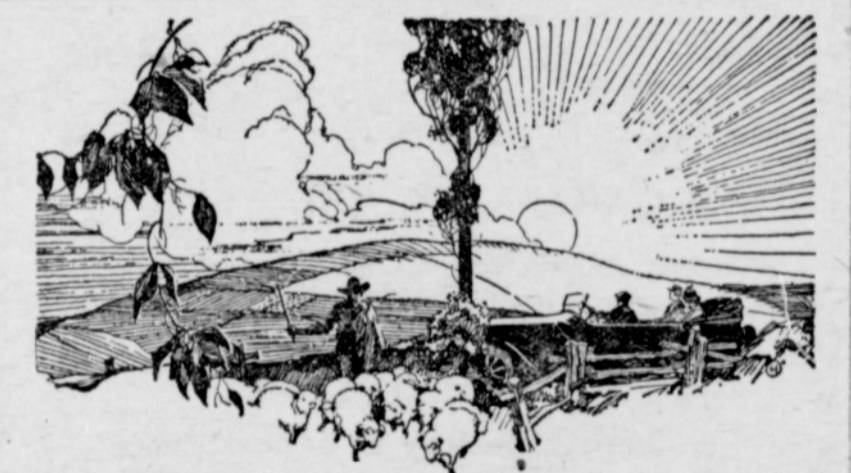

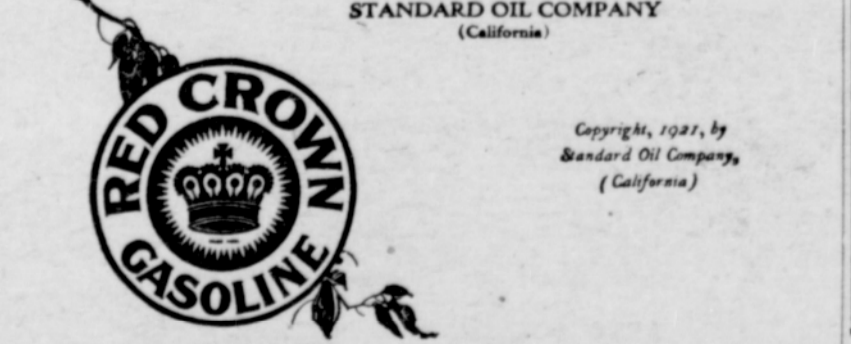
