LARGE ENROLLMENT IN GRESHAM GRADE SCHOOL

Yesterday was a busy day at Gresham grade school where the teachers enrolled what was doubtless the largest number of pupils to enter on a first day of school. The first grade enrolled 45, practically all of whom are in school for the first time. A number of new faces are seen in the other grades also. The first day's entrants numbered 226, of whom 135 were boys and 91 girls. This is 20 more than entered on the first of school last year. The enrollment by grades is as follows: first, 45; second, 33; third, 22; fourth, 31; fifth, 27; sixth, 27; seventh, 17; eighth, 24.

Principal Quicksall says that the schoolhouse and grounds are in good shape and that the spirit and enthusiasm of pupils and teachers is unbounded.
