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CLUB WORK BETTER THAN LAST YEAR

Every person who visits the 15th annual fair of Multnomah county and fails to visit the Boys' and Girls' club building in the grove and their livestock and poultry exhibits will miss one of the big features this year. Never before has the club exhibit been so fine. The quality of work is extra fine and the booths are attractive.

H. C. Seymour, state club leader, expressed himself as being well pleased with the work. "Given an impartial judge" he said, "I would take potato exhibits, canning, sewing, etc., and place it in the open class and I'm sure that the youngsters would carry off at least 50 per cent of the prizes."

"The garden exhibit, I believe, is the best and largest ever put on by any county in the state," said Mr. Seymour. "In fact" he added, "the whole show is excellent." The poultry exhibit is strong this year and the general standard of all work much higher than ever before.

N. C. Jameson, livestock expert from Oregon Agriculture College, and H. A. Lindgren, also from the college, assisted J. L. Allen, livestock leader of the clubs, in placing the stock Monday afternoon. The calf club boys turned out 100 per cent to show off their stock and the pig club boys were a close second with 85 per cent of their members present. The sheep club members came 75 per cent strong.

Awards were made Monday afternoon and the club boys are proudly showing the ribbons which they have won.

This is the first time the city clubs have made a straight club work exhibit and they have a large and splendid exhibit. The city clubs have some specially fine poultry exhibits this year.

FACTORY PACKS 400 TONS OF CUCUMBERS

The Oregon Pickle and Canning company, Inc., has practically finished the season's pack of pickles this year. The frost of last week cut the season short and the year's pickling will only be about 50 per cent of normal due partly to dry weather and partly to the frost.

In spite of the short season the local concern has filled 24 tanks of salted pickles or about 400 tons. These cucumbers are in a salt brine and will be taken out and prepared in various ways for the market.

There are also 600 barrels of dill pickles and 100 barrels of dill weed packed in brine ready for future use and 20 barrels of cauliflower pickled. In all cases the barrels are 50 gallon size.

Fifty-six growers furnished the 400 or more tons of cucumbers which have been handled here this year. The contracts were made early in the season when the company first started operations here.

Among the largest growers are T. Kido, R. Asakawa, K. Tanabe and F. Tanaka. Among those furnishing the finest quality of cucumbers were R. Asakawa and R. Ninomiya.

The better quality is the result of careful picking which keeps the larger proportion of cucumbers in grade number 1. This grade which is those not larger than 2 1/2 inches, is worth \$60 per ton. Grade two which is from 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 is worth \$30 and the third grade from 3 1/2 to 5 inches including also all crooked pickles of any sort, is worth only \$8.

It does not pay to let the pickles grow too large. This is illustrated by the comparison of prices and pounds which has been made by Mr. Stafford who is in charge of the work. "It takes" he says "200 lbs. of number one pickles to bring \$6. It takes twice that weight or 400 pounds to make \$6 worth of grade number 2, while \$6 is all 1500 pounds of grade number three will bring.

About 50 per cent of this season's pack will be first grade pickles.
